## Dr. Pittman And Costa Rican Educators Arrive Here Friday

### Telephone Coop To Get A Loan For \$453,000

Saturday, January 17, has been proclaimed by Mayor W. A. (Bill) Bowen as "Costa Rica Day" in honor of a group of Costa Rican educators who will arrive here tomorrow afternoon with Dr. Marvin S. Pittman from Costa Rica, Central America.

Dr. Pittman has been in Costa Rica since September, 1952, on a special Educational Mission under the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization. He is bringing a group of eleven Costa Ricans here to make a tour of eight states to observe and study the American School System.

Dr. Pittman and the group of Costa Ricans will arrive at the Savannah Airport tomorrow afternoon by air at 4:32 a. m. but there the contract was executed.

Mr. Metts and Wm. Joe Neville, attorney for the Cooperative, were in Washington on Monday and Tuesday of this week, and while there the contract was executed, subject to the final approval of the Cooperative's officers.

The contract, together with the government mortgage and note to cover the loan, will be forwarded to Statesboro soon for acceptance by the Cooperative.

The funds mentioned were allocated last May by the Administrator, but have been withheld pending completion of engineering studies and a feasibility study. Upon the completion of final stage engineering plans and specifications, the funds should be released for actual purchase of materials for 770 farm homes immediately, with plans to serve about twice that number ultimately.

The legal work required of the cooperative is several months ahead of schedule, according to the advice of the Administrator's attorneys in Washington, but the final phases of engineering, legal work and procurement of materials and supplies will consume some time; however, Mr. Metts stated that the telephone system is now a virtual certainty. The telephone system will be in place by the time the cooperative is ready to begin construction. Cobb, president of the bank, made a report of the years activities, pointing out that the bank's deposits had grown from \$2,211,370.50 on December 31, 1951, to \$3,477,526.85, and that cash and quick assets had grown from \$2,211,370.50 to \$2,881,406.61. Loans and discounts had increased from \$580,845.16 to \$783,768.55.

Mr. Cobb stated that in his opinion "business has accepted the change of administration as a healthy change and that the men present in the bank have selected an outstanding and that the general thinking is they'll do a good job and will handle the affairs of our nation wisely."

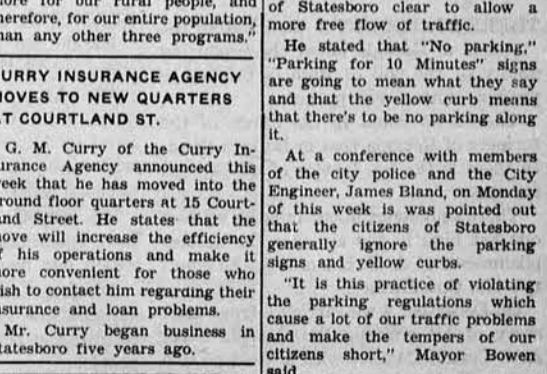
He instructed the police to keep the areas controlled by these signs clear.

VISITORS FROM COSTA RICA

Who are the company? Well, there are eleven in the group and they are the top folks in the educational system in our sister Republic of Costa Rica. Costa Rica, you know is a small country located down in Central America. The Republic of Panama is south of it, the Republic of Colombia and Nicaragua is north of it. It is about as big as the state of Georgia, would be if a line were drawn from Columbia to Columbus and we took only that portion which would lie south of that line. It has less than a million people. It's Capital is San Jose and it is about the size of Mason, Costa Rica is a very pretty country. The climate of the central plateau is most delightful all the year with very little change in the temperature from one season to the next and from noon-day to midnight. No fire is ever needed to keep warm and light woolen clothes are always comfortable.

WHO ARE THEY?

O yes, you wanted to know who they are. Well, three of them are Presidents of Teachers colleges, five of them are the people who decide what happens in the high schools, and three of them are the people who decide about the teaching of Reading, Ritten, and Rhythmic—they look after the elementary schools. They have, what, at first sounds like VERY FUNNY names but when you once get acquainted with them, they are as simple and easy as Smith, Brown, and Jones. Here they are: Mr. Isaac Zofelra, head of all the high schools; Mrs. Elena de Cabesera, principal of a girls' high school; Miss Lelia Figarosa, Dean of Girls, in the largest Girls' School; Mr. Joaquin Vargas, Principal of a general exponential high school; Mr. Marco T. Salazar, Principal of Heredia High School; Mr. Humberto Munoz, Director of teacher training in the field; Mr. Ovidio Soto, President of the Normal School at Turrialba; Mr.

Manuel H. Porras, President of the Normal School at San Ramon; Mr. Rafael Cortes, Director of Primary schools in Costa Rica; Mr. Jose M. Chaverri, Director of Primary schools in San Jose; and Mr. Bolivar Moya, supervisor of elementary schools.

REPRESENT SCHOOL SYSTEM

These eleven people represent the entire school system of Costa Rica. What they think and what they do will have a very large influence in what happens in the schools of Costa Rica. They are going to begin their five weeks tour first, by meeting the DEAR PEOPLE ON EARTH—the people of Statesboro and environs. They are going to visit the new school in Sylva, where Principal Jim Jordan and Supt. Knapp Boddiford are having Saturday classes so these visitors can visit them. On Monday morning, they will visit the Teachers College in general and the Laboratory School in particular. They will then run down to the Myrtle factory in Durham, N. C. and Guyton McLendon's Band—both of which are worth the trip to the States to see.

There will be other things around about Statesboro which they will NEED to see—those tobacco warehouses. Four weeks later they will visit Liggitt & Myers factory in Durham, N. C. and find out what is done with the Bulloch County tobacco. They should also see the peanut plant, the turpentine plant and other things, too numerous to mention and too numerous for them to see in the time which will be available.

I KNOW that if they were to turn around and go back home after having spent three days in Statesboro, the trip would have been worth it all cost. THAT is how I feel about the place "with our nature smiles" because she is so much pleased with the people who inhabit the land are doing to take care of what nature has done and is doing.

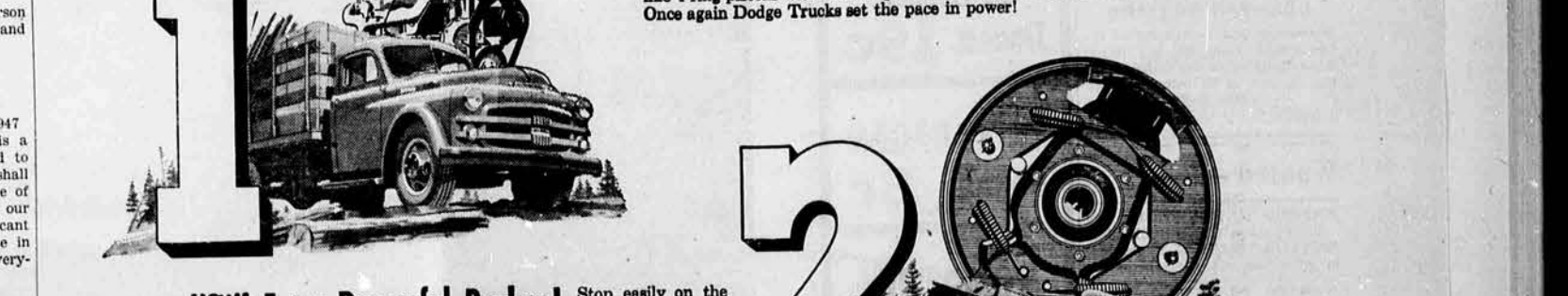

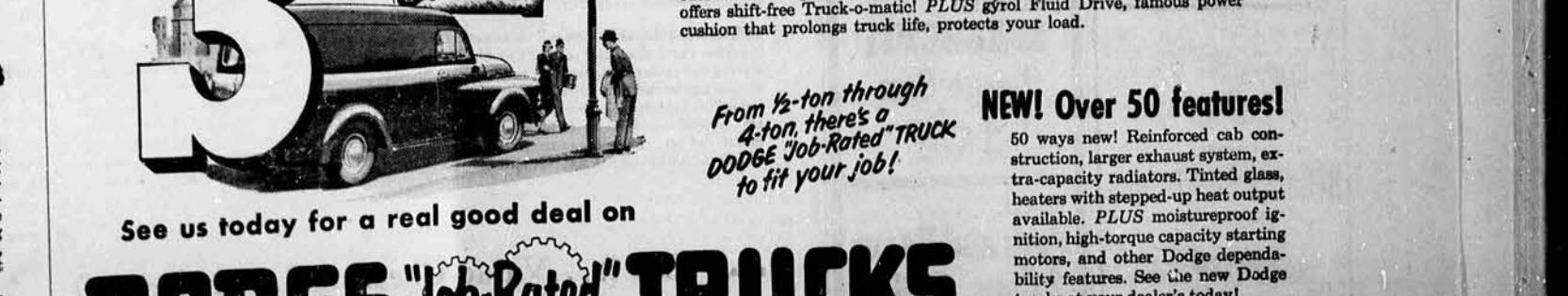

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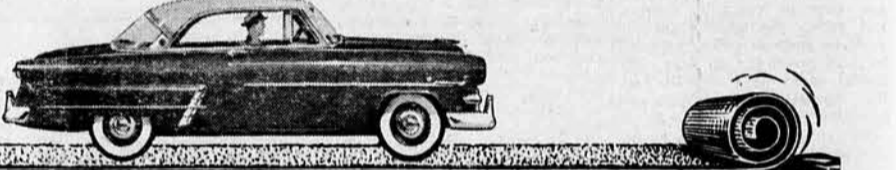

The membership of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Chamber of Commerce, at its regular meeting Tuesday of this week, gave the Steering Committee a unanimous and complete vote of confidence and authorized it to take whatever action the members thought necessary to assure the continuing of the operation of the Chamber of Commerce.

The vote of confidence followed the announcement by Loy Waters, president of the City Council, that he had notified the Steering Committee that the Council had voted to suspend the financial aid to the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Waters explained that the Council had been giving the Chamber of Commerce a like amount each month.

**Local Hospital Is Approved For Nursing Program**

Announcement is made this week by Maybel Korssel, director of Field Service, Program of Emory School of Nursing, Atlanta, that the Bulloch County Hospital has been approved as a center for giving opportunity for educational advantages for the nurses in the community and as an affliated center for nursing students in community nursing.

Three years ago the League of Nursing Education of Georgia found that there is a great need for nurses in Georgia, and found that the shortage of qualified nurses is a condition dangerous to the welfare of the citizens of the state.

With their findings they appealed to Emory University for help. The authorities at Emory presented the problem to the W. R. Kellogg Foundation and explained the need and a grant was made to carry out the proposed program.

The objectives of the program include: the provision of better care of patients in the rural communities in Georgia by giving educational opportunities to all nursing staffs, and to provide a solid base for broadening the scope of student education.

The program has the approval and cooperation of the Hospital Authority of Georgia and local and state health departments and the local medical staff of the hospital.

Miss June Hargrove, superintendent of nurses at the Bulloch County Hospital, stated that this program will mean a great deal to this community. She pointed out that for it to be successful it will all for the cooperation of all the citizens of this community.
