Bulloch county, along with the other open range counties, will be asked to vote on whether to have a "fence" law July 1, 1953, representative A. J. Trapnell, stated to his constituents at the Bulloch Farm Bureau Tuesday night.

Mr. Trapnell was making a legislative report on his own chapter following the recent session of the state legislature when he brought out the livestock voting story. As the law now stands, it will be called on to vote on it again every general election until passed, he stated.

A. S. Humm, state director of federal crop insurance, outlined the need for insurance as a necessity these days when production costs are so high to the Middleground group on Thursday night.

W. C. Hodges, the Middleground president, stated that their chapter would have a quiet and content in the county contest and that Mrs. Juanita Abernathy would be asked to assist in selecting group representatives.

A motion picture, "Rubber River," was used by Ivanhoe Friday night as part of its program. C. M. Graham, Ivanhoe president and member of the county PMA committee, stated that so far as he knew there would not be any additional edible peanut acreage this year as in the past two years.

However, he did urge those that were not going to plant their acreage this year to turn the allotments back to the county committee for distribution to those that would plant the acreage. He assured them that this would not affect their 1954 allotments. They would be released for 1953 only.

The Farm Bureau held the March meeting last Wednesday night at the community house, and a steak supper was served to a large group of men. John C. Crowley conducted the business meeting. J. H. Wyatt introduced a resolution that the Brooklet Farm Bureau go on record to recommend to Congress that the 90 per cent parity be kept. Several men gave important facts about curing tobacco.

A. F. Himmott, state winner in the 1952 cotton contest, also spoke to the group.

Byron Iyer, county farm agent, gave an informative talk pertaining to farming.
