The committee chairmen were asked to come clear enough for the bottom grade to be seen in 12 inches of water. This usually requires an application every 3 or 4 weeks. The last application should be made in September or October, the pond thus receiving between 8 and 14 applications per year.

For best results a pond must be fertilized periodically throughout the growing season. The use of only 1 or 2 applications of fertilizer per year will not give good results.

To follow a regular schedule of fertilizing, you should begin applying the fertilizer now. See your Soil Conservationist now and he will help you get started. He will give you information on the kind and amount of fertilizer to use, etc.

Time To Fertilize Farm Fish Ponds

The time is here to begin fertilizing farm ponds. The first application of fertilizer should be made during the first warm weather of spring. The time is here now. You do not fertilize during winter months.

Ten years ago the idea of increasing fish production by fertilizing pond waters was called impractical, theoretical and ridiculous, but ask A. P. Murphy who lives north of Statesboro what he thinks about it now. He has been fertilizing his pond for some time and claims he is getting some mighty good results.

Fertilizer should be applied weekly until the water becomes so cloudy with algae (green or brown color), you cannot see the bottom or a bright object 12 inches under the surface. Most ponds require 3 to 6 weekly applications to raise the fertility level to meet this color test. Subsequent applications should be made whenever the water begins to lose this green or brown color and be fertilized again.
