Our Congressman Gains Statue

OUR CONGRESSMAN, Prince H. Preston Jr., is becoming a bigger man in our National Congress.

He was given a major part of the credit for the defeat which the House Democrats recently gave Republicans in rejecting a proposal to grant three cabinet officers "absolute discretion" to fire employees in their departments when they deemed it "advisable in the interest of the United States."

Congressman Preston, who is a member of the important appropriations committee, was one of the leaders of the Democratic opposition to the Republican sponsored rider to an appropriations bill.

He shared honors with Rep. Rooney, New York Democrat, in occupying the minority leadership desk and allotting time for opposition speakers during the debate.

Congressman Preston also was a joint sponsor of the motion which struck the offending rider from the bill. He made a vigorous speech denouncing the rider and took an active part in the debate.

According to the Atlanta Constitution's Washington Correspondent, Gladstone Williams, the sweeping firing authority which would have suspended the job rights of veterans and career nonveterans was eliminated from the State, Justice and Commerce departments appropriation bill by vote of 181 to 167. Under it, the three cabinet heads would have been given freedom to fire employees, regardless of veterans preference rights and civil service rules.

In his speech, Congressman Preston

accused Republicans of political patronage maneuvering in seeking to give the cabinet officers authority to discard workers. He told the House there was no need for such a provision since President Eisenhower, acting under existing authority, had already undertaken to deal with the problem on a common basis, putting all agencies of the government under one rule, which he said was only proper.

It was one of the first major defeats the Republicans have suffered since taking over organizational control of the new Congress.

Former speaker of the House, Rayburn and other Democratic leaders complimented our Congressman for the effective way he handled the opposition.

And the citizens of Savannah should be thankful that their Congressman stands in high esteem in our National Congress.

He is now active in the fight to save the U. S. Public Health Hospital in Savannah from a contemplated appropriation cut. Congressman Preston is joined in the fight by Senators Russell and George.

Congressman Preston has written a letter to the people in Savannah, saying, "I will do all within my power to keep the appropriation at a level which would insure the continuous operation of our hospital."

That's our Congressman, hard at work, representing not only the First District of Georgia, but every section of the nation.

It is an ugly business, and every effort should be made to stop it.—Waynesboro True-Citizen.

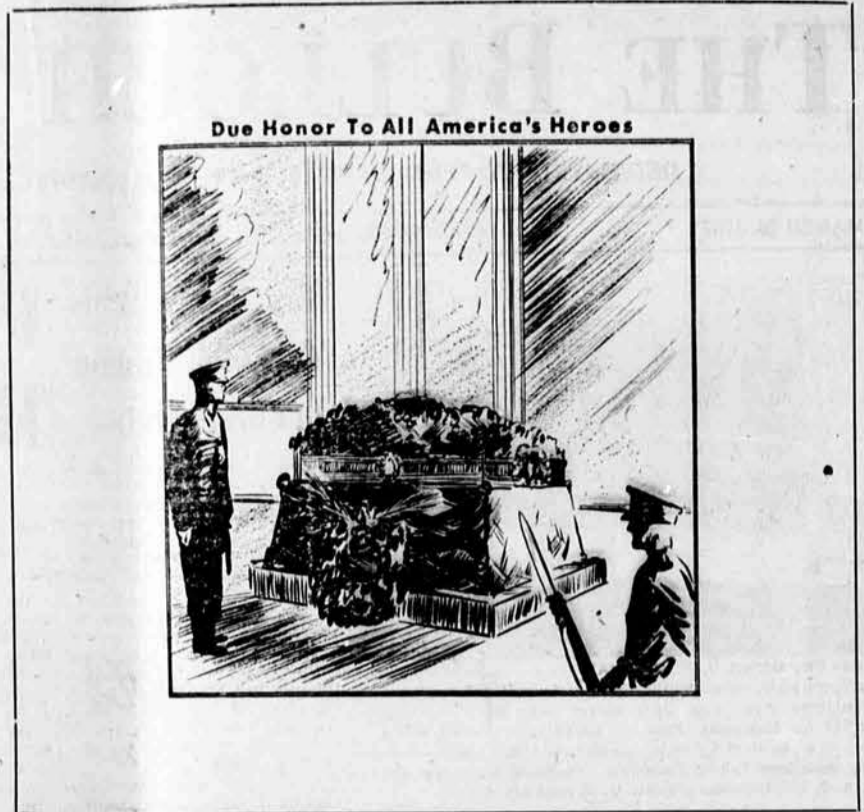
How Right He Was

Know Your Bulloch County?

How well do you know your Bulloch County? If you know it pretty good here is an opportunity to share your knowledge with someone who plans to put it to good use.

Mr. John H. Goff, at Emory University, is writing a book on Georgia. He's gathering information from all over. There are some things about Bulloch County that he would like to know so he wrote Donald McDougald, who is a graduate of Emory, to help him.

And Donald thinks that there are people in Bulloch County who can help Mr. Goff.

Here are some of the things he wishes to know. In the Northwest section of Bulloch County, running northwest-southwest there is an old thoroughfare called the "Two Chop Road." Do any of our readers know where this road came from and where it went?

South of Statesboro, where the Burkhalter-Pembroke roads meet is a crossroad called Middle Ground; and above Statesboro toward Blitch is another Middle Ground. How do these communities get their names? Anybody know?

Does anybody in Bulloch know about the "Old Rebel Road"? This thoroughfare seemed to circle around Savannah, beginning in Liberty County and curving through Bulloch, seemingly headed toward the Savannah River, across Effingham County. It has been mentioned numbers of times on old post-revolutionary hand-drawn maps. Know anything about the "Old Rebel Road"?

Does anyone in Bulloch County or surrounding counties, know of the "Old Sunbury Road"? This thoroughfare was one of the earliest (1794) long roads sponsored by the State of Georgia. It ran from Greensboro to Sunbury, and must have passed all the way across Bulloch. It has been found on old plats in the counties above, but not in Bulloch. You know anything about the "Old Sunbury Road" in Bulloch?

If any of our readers know anything about these things you may write to us and we'll forward the information to Don McDougald to forward to Mr. Goff.

Any information about "The Rebel Road" and the "Sunbury Road" should include points which these roads passed, churches, school sites, cemeteries, crossroads, etc. Mr. Goff says he has maps of the area and can easily pick out the courses of the road with the above information furnished.

There are three lookout towers in Bulloch County. The forest fire towers are located at Nevis, at Arcola and at Hill Top.

Rural electrification consists of more than extension of power and light to rural homes and communities, according to engineers for the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Georgia. It includes the design and layout of wiring and lighting for farmsteads, farm homes, and livestock, storage and service structures.

South Georgia produces most of Georgia's naval stores, according to foresters for the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Georgia. The producing period is from March to November mainly, at a time when gum flows during the growing season. Cash income is available at regular intervals during this period.

Specialists for the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Georgia state that there are two basic reasons for cultivating. These are to control weeds and to break the surface crust. They say that, if there are no farm homes, no surface crust, do not cultivate.
