mouth bass (trout). The last pond with requests is through the Soil Conservation Service office was stocked with bass about two weeks ago. This was William Crowley's pond at Brookfield. Yes, a feeding puncture made by a male boll weevil will cause a square to shed, say cotton specialists for the University of Georgia Agricultural Extension Service.

Available food supply is the main factor in boll weevil migration, according to cotton specialists for the University of Georgia Agricultural Extension Service.

Important pasture for hot dry periods as well as early grazing. Fred Hiltch of Westside, Ga., Kennedy and Aubrey James Riggs, near Jimps, and A. P. Murphy, just north of Statesboro, are a few of the many farmers in the county who have discovered the good qualities of sericea pasture. (1) Early spring grazing; (2) Drought and heat resistance; (3) High protein and other food value content; (4) Low fertilizer requirement; and (5) Excellent soil building and soil protection.

Many farmers in the county are planning to save some seed from their sericea this fall. R. Y. Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service has made some important observations along this line. Seed production will be much greater on fertilized than on unfertilized land. Combining will be easier with less seed loss if sericea is cut for hay or grazed in early spring and then allowed to grow uniformly the remainder of the season. Combine when seed begins to shatter in the fall, and if no artificial drying is to be had, spread seed very thinly and air until thoroughly dry, otherwise seed will heat and ruin.

There are a few seed cleaners and driers in this vicinity which will enable farmers to take their seed directly from the combine and avoid the spreading and uncertainty of drying.

Since farmers are catching up with their field work, many are devoting their time to building good farm ponds. Ray Traynall and J. H. Putch of Nevis, J. A. Banks of Register, and Paul Neamith, Dan Lingo and S. B. Waters of Westside, are among those who have built or are building ponds. The Millen Fish Hatchery, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, has completed stocking 75 ponds in Bulloch county with large

## Bankers loan farmer more than other agencies

During 1952 Georgia farmers called upon the state's banks to provide them with more credit than was extended by any other type of lending agency, according to W. G. Cobb, president of the Bulloch County Bank, who represents the Georgia Bankers Association as Bulloch County Key Banker.

Quoting from the twelfth annual study of farm lending by the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Cobb noted that on January 1, 1953, Georgia banks had loans totaling \$58,373,000 outstanding to farmers, compared with \$27,916,000 held by Farmers Home Administration, who had the second largest block of farm loans outstanding.

"As they have in the past, the state's farmers continued last year to turn mostly to their banks when they needed credit," Mr. Cobb said. "The amount of credit the farmer needs to run a successful operation is much larger today than it was in past decades," he continues. "Farming is now a mechanized, highly competitive enterprise; and operating a profitable farm involves a much greater investment in machinery and modern agricultural methods. Hence, adequate funds are a prime concern to the farm operator. Meeting his needs for operating credit is one of the most important services of Georgia banks."
