V. A. Hospital Policy Brings Action from Local Legionnaires

Veterans of the American Legion are being urged to file strong protests with their congressional delegations against a recent order of the Veterans' Administration. The order states that those with non-service-connected disabilities must certify their inability to pay hospitalization charges elsewhere.

At a meeting of Dexter Allen Post 90, the American Legion held on November 19, B. E. Hodges, Commander of the Post, criticized what he called "Requiring Veterans who have served their country honorably during the time of war to sign papers before being admitted to a Veterans' Hospital."

"This," he added, "is the rankest sort of false economy."

The V. A. order requires veterans with non-service-connected disabilities to sign affidavits giving explicit information about their real personal property, current assets and average monthly net income from the previous six months.
