Forest fires in Bulloch just don't happen

Forest fires in Bulloch County don't just happen. They are caused by carelessness. They are caused by J. W. Roberts, County Forest Ranger for the Bulloch County Forestry Unit made this statement this week in calling for "all-out warfare" against forest fires in this area.

"Man's carelessness," he said, "is responsible for nine out of 10 forest fires in this area." The Ranger said that one of the most dangerous practices as far as fire causes are concerned was that of burning brush, trash, and leaves. Another careless practice which causes forest fires is building campfires improperly.

Forest fires are also caused by carelessness in throwing away matches and cigarettes onto a dry forest floor. They are also caused by persons who throw lighted cigarettes and matches from automobiles speeding along the highway.

The result is burned and blackened acres of woodlands, the destruction of timber, of recreation areas and of damage to good topsoil—damage which eventually will result in soil erosion.

"When man stops being careless," the Ranger said, "our forest fire worries will be ended. We need the cooperation of ALL citizens, however, if we are to make an effective fight against wildfire."

Yule Seal Idea Was From Denmark
 This year millions of Americans have received a letter from their local chapter of the National Tuberculosis Association containing Christmas seals, the seasonal reminder of the never-ending fight to stamp out the disease.

The idea was conceived by a Danish postal clerk. He thought of the idea in 1903 while mailing Christmas packages and letters.

The clerk was Einar Holboell. He mentioned it to his fellow workers and they decided it would be a great help in defraying the cost of fighting the disease. The idea reached King Christian, who approved, and the image of Queen Louise was placed on the first seals in 1904.

Jacob Riis, Danish-born American, heard about the idea and sold it to the American public in 1907 through a magazine article. A Red Cross worker, Miss Emily Bissell, started the first American sales that year.

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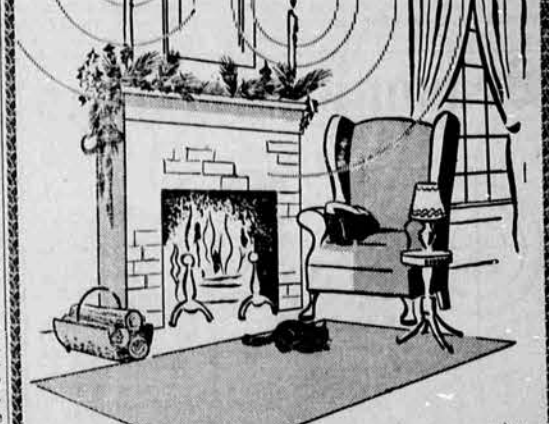

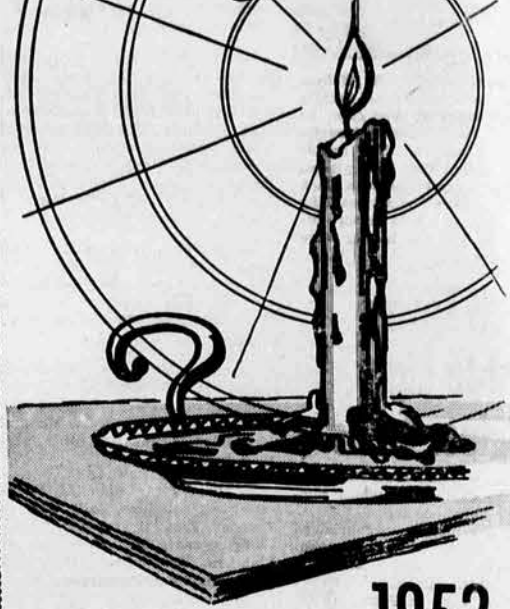

Sea Island Bank ups its capital stock to \$125,000

A new chapter of progress was written Friday by the Sea Island Bank when its stockholders voted unanimously to increase its capital stock from \$50,000.00 to \$125,000.00.

At the annual meeting which was held at one o'clock at Mrs. Bryant's new private dining room the largest number of stockholders ever to attend an annual stockholders meeting was present, representing in person three-fourths of the capital stock. Sixty-five persons were present.

The first order of business was the election of directors for the ensuing year, which were: D. Percy Averitt, Hinton Booth, R. J. Brown, Alfred Dorman, C. B. McAllister, C. P. O'Hiff, Horace Z. Smith and D. B. Turner.

The plan for increasing the capital was explained by C. B. McAllister, president, who reviewed the history of the bank since its organization in 1911. The deposits have increased from \$240,000.00 in 1933 to over \$4,250,000.00 in 1953, and all other phases of bank activities have shown equal growth. After a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors in October was read the plan for increasing the capital stock was accepted by the stockholders by unanimous consent. The plan calls for issuing 1,500 shares of additional stock at \$50.00 per share, and each stockholder will be permitted to purchase one and one-half shares for each share now owned in his name.

This will give the bank a capital structure of approximately \$350,000.00, consisting of \$125,000.00 capital, \$125,000.00 surplus, and approximately \$100,000.00 undivided profits.

Each stockholder was presented with a regular dividend check representing 10 per cent dividend on each share, and a special check representing a special 3 per cent dividend.

Immediately following the meeting the directors met and elected the following officers for the year 1954: C. P. O'Hiff, chairman of the board; C. B. McAllister, president; D. B. Turner, vice president; Kermit R. Carr, cashier; and Herman E. Bray, assistant cashier.

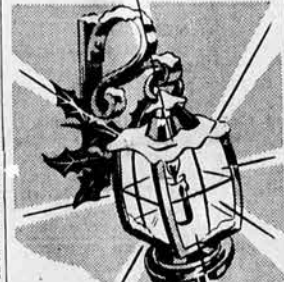

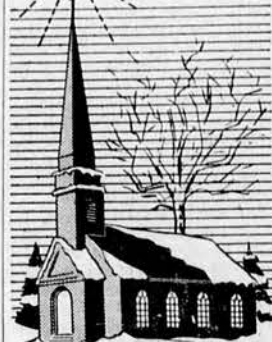

Mr. Lanier explained it this way: The bond issue will cost about \$32,000 per year. The lumber now being bought by the county runs about \$42,000 annually. During the past 30 days the county paid near \$5,000 for lumber alone.

The present estimate on the jail calls for not more than \$170,000, the additional space for the clerk's office, county farm and home agents, and public toilets on the courthouse is placed at not more than \$80,000, and the money to build concrete bridges or put in concrete pipe in the roads where needed during the next five years is placed at \$250,000. Mr. Lanier was not too sure that the money set up for the bridges would do the entire job but did think that for the next five years this is all that could be spent wisely.

The money now being spent for lumber, although essential to maintain the bridges, is just money gone for ever and is one of those recurring expenses that can never be regained. This some \$42,000 will retire the bond issue and it will probably never be necessary to levy any additional tax to pay it off, Mr. Lanier thinks.

The past seven grand juries have asked for a new jail, he pointed out. Something has to be done about all three of these items. The county does not have the money. A bond issue is the only recourse, Mr. Lanier figures.

The bond election has been set for January 5.

Mr. Lanier told the Nevils group that the State Highway Board has promised to start work on a road from Pine Inn to Burnsed's bridges in 1954. No idea was expressed as to where the road would be put but the engineers would probably be placed on it when they finish the present survey in Chatham county for the new Tybee road. He also stated that he hoped to get Bearfoot bridge built next year in a project that would put
