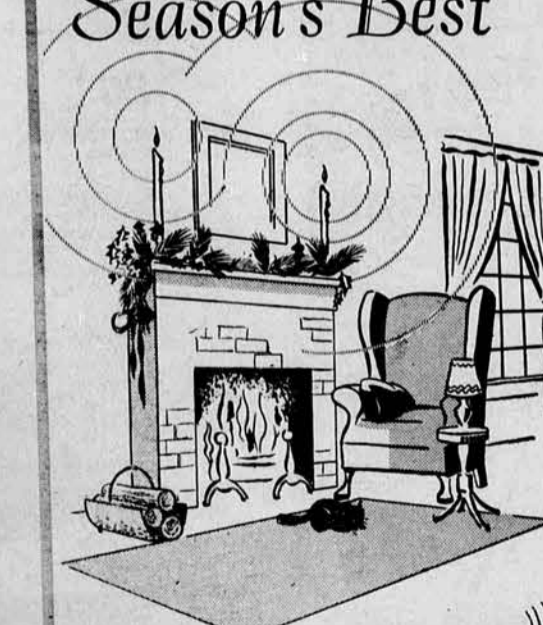

Tobacco clinic here January 6

A tobacco clinic will be held in the Bulloch county courthouse January 6 at 10 a. m. Byron Dyer, county agent, announces.

The tobacco research workers from the Coastal Plain Experiment Station, Tifton, have been procured for the clinic. Dr. J. G. Gaines, the pathologist, will also be along to help with the disease discussions.

There was considerable diseased tobacco in Bulloch county last year. An effort was made at that time to hold a clinic right out in some of these fields. At the recent county Farm Bureau annual meeting the group asked that a clinic be held prior to the planting time. The extension tobacco specialists and the experiment station research workers agreed to come here Wednesday of next week.

Teachers whip U. of Fla. 99-86; Ga. Tech 101-81 in Gator Bowl

They were as hot as a fire popper—the members of the Georgia Teachers College basketball team were—and they scorched the University of Florida 99 to 86 on Monday night, and then burnt the Georgia Tech team to a crisp 101 to 81 on Tuesday night in the Gator Bowl Tournament now being held in the Jacksonville Junior College gym in Jacksonville, as part of the annual Gator Bowl festivities.

On Monday night the Georgia Teachers College set a new Gator Bowl scoring record as they defeated the University of Florida 99 to 86. The Teachers' men got off to a slow start in the first quarter, trailing 21 to 16. Early in the second period, they started a drive which produced 21 points in less than five minutes, and shot them to a 13 point lead with four minutes to go.

Johnny Hendrix, writing in the Savannah Morning News, said: "It is hard to single out any one player from the game last night (Monday night). Ed Hoover's shooting was nothing short of sensational, but for the matter, so was the case with four others. The team had better than 45 per cent average from the floor."

On Monday night Georgia Tech defeated the University of Georgia in a tight 66 to 64 game in the other opening game of the tournament.

On Tuesday night the Teachers, still hot as a fire popper, set two more records in defeating a stubborn, scrappy Georgia Tech team, 101 to 81.
