

**SPROUTING CAN NOW BE CONTROLLED**  
Sprouting of stored potatoes and onions can now be controlled with a chemical sprayed on the vegetables before they are harvested. This chemical, maleic hydrazide, contains a growth regulator. It has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture after four years of testing at state agricultural experiment stations throughout the nation.

ment of Entomology, reports. During recent years it was necessary to procure a permit to buy these insecticide fumigants for wire worms, white-fringed beetles and some of the other subterranean insects that are found in Bulloch county.

Most of the fertilizer plants are now preparing the insecticide fertilizers and it can be bought through the regular dealers.

Mr. Whitehead also had an encouraging word for the city dwellers that are bothered with white-fringed beetles, chinch bugs and other pests in their lawns and flower gardens. These fertilizers are available for this use as well, he pointed out.

Most of the insecticide fertilizers being made up in this area will contain chlorodane or DDT. However, some other fertilizer mixtures such as dieldrin aldrin, and heptachlor are approved for non-food crop use only.

On the average row crop Mr. Whitehead recommended that farmers use one-half per cent mixture of DDT or one-fourth per cent mixture of chlorodane. For tobacco and other crops where a large amount of fertilizer per acre is used, he said that this ratio be reduced to 50 per cent. Some

**CARRIER OFFERS NEW AIR CONDITIONING UNIT FOR SMALL HOMES**

Completely installed in the average size home with a good furnace, this will cost only slightly more than two individual room air conditioners, such as those which would handle the living room and one bedroom.
