OUR DUTY TO THE EARTH  
By W. TAPP BENNETT, Director Agricultural Department Central of Ga. Railway.  
Several years before the constructive work of the Soil Conservation Service was organized under the leadership of Dr. Hugh H. Bennett, a noteworthy talk was made by a distinguished agricultural secretary of agriculture who served in the "Little Cabinet" during World War I under Dr. David Franklin Houston. The subject was "The Farmer's Place in Our Civilization." It attracted a great deal of attention and had wide distribution at that time. It still deserves thoughtful attention.

The speaker was the Hon. Clarence Ousley, a native son of Lowndes County, Ga., who moved to Texas in the 1880s. The following is quoted from the address by this great native Georgian:  
"If we ever contemplate the earth with reverence, I like the phrase, 'Mother Earth'—the source of all our sustenance, and the repository of all its elements and attributes the soil seems to me to be the most appealing and vital, and I cannot regard its depletion as vandalism and sacrilege. The good God gave us but one soil, and he gave it for the use of his children to the end of time. We are but his trustees in its occupancy and preservation of the estate of our posterity. If we deposit it, if we fail to maintain it, if we leave it less fruitful than we received it, we are unfaithful trustees, and I feel that in the sight of God we are culpable. And if we rob the estate of orphan children of whom we made guardians by decree of court."

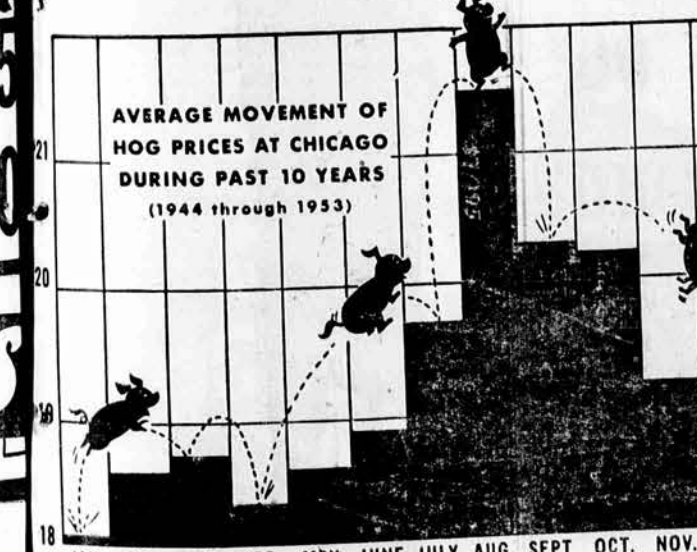

Preston says 'very horror' of H-Bomb may act to prevent a third world war

Representative Prince H. Preston said in an address in Savannah, April 20, that the "very horror" of the hydrogen bomb may prevent a third world war because "the threat of massive retaliation that we have promised may well give pause to the most powerful despots and cause him to refrain from unleashing the fury that would, inevitably, be visited on his people and probably on himself."

The Congressman stated that he had supported measures to provide a great radar network to give warning of an air attack, and appropriations for an adequate air force. He pointed out, however, that "There is no known defense against this terrible weapon" and recalled that the Air Force admitted it "could only intercept a fraction of any mass flight of planes intent on bombing our cities."

"It seems to me," Mr. Preston told his audience at the Kiwanis Club, "that in this hour of mortal peril we individual Americans must once more look to our own resources, our own ingenuity, and our own God to examine our faith and courage in this time of danger."

The First District representative likened the present danger of hydrogen bombs to the "face of surprise Indian attacks, when the pioneers were on their own with no federal soldiers or local militia to defend them."

"Sudden Indian onslaughts on wilderness outposts brought absolute destruction and death to pioneer settlements as surely as the hydrogen bomb could bring desolation to our cities today," Congressman Preston said.

"Let me suggest that as we pray for guidance for our leaders to channel our terrible anger into peaceful objectives," Mr. Preston concluded, "that we pray just as fervently that God may revive in us the qualities of faith and courage that enabled our ancestors to contrive means of survival and progress amid the deadly perils that surrounded them for so long."

A full color 16mm sound film of the explosion of the first hydrogen bomb in the Pacific Ocean was shown to the group at the conclusion of the Congressman's remarks. This film, just released by the Civil Defense Administration for restricted showing to civilian audiences, was made under the sponsorship of the Atomic Energy Commission on Atomic Energy.
