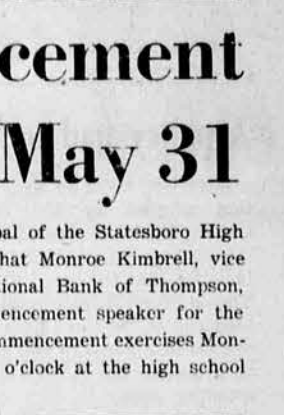

Macedonia Church observes Centennial Sunday, May 16

It will be a great day for the members of Macedonia Baptist Church when they gather Sunday, May 16, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the church.

Macedonia Church is in the 48th G.M. District. To get there, drive out East Main street. Follow the paved road to Mr. Frank Proctor's home, about three miles from Statesboro. Turn left just beyond Mr. Proctor's home. Drive straight along this road, past a white house, the drive of Mrs. J. T. Williams, on the right side of the road, to the top of a red clay hill. Follow this road and you will come to the century old church.

The program, in observance of the church's 100th year, will begin at 10:00 o'clock Sunday morning with special music and talks by outstanding visiting Baptists.

From 12 noon, until 2 o'clock in the afternoon, lunch will be served "on-the-ground." The afternoon session will be informal when the Bulloch Four Quartet, assisted by other singers, will have charge of the program.

The early history of Macedonia Church compiled in 1940 was taken from the original minutes of the church. In the class of Baptists known in Bulloch county until James R. Miller, a Baptist minister, formerly a foreign missionary, and Sabbath school. On account of his belief, the ministers of other churches entered into a resolution to build a church in the name of Jesus. The result was the founding in 1854 of Macedonia Church.

In 1855, four acres of land was donated by Nancy Miller, A. B. Miller and J. E. C. Tillman and the church, which still stands, was built. The lumber to build the church was sawed in Emanuel county and floated down this Ogeechee river. The first services of the Macedonia Church, many members living in Screven county, came in carts to Williams cross on the Ogeechee river. The church was founded in 1854 of Macedonia Church.

In November, 1855, James Wood and Robert Miller were ordained as the first deacons of the church. James R. Miller died August 25, 1857 and his is the first grave in Macedonia cemetery. John R. Miller succeeded him as pastor of the church. Macedonia may well be called the "mother" church of Missionary Baptist Churches in this county, for as time went on and the population increased, new churches were established from Macedonia. First there was Eureka in 1878, Statesboro in 1882, Corinth in 1885, Chito in 1895 and Kilmir in 1917.
