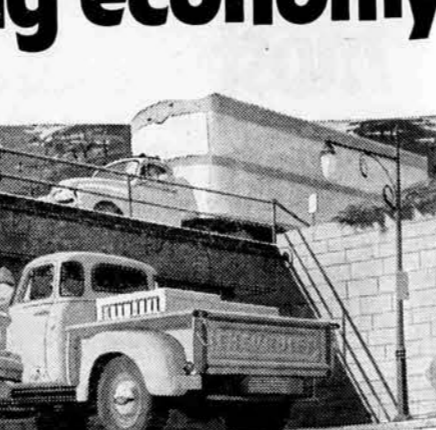

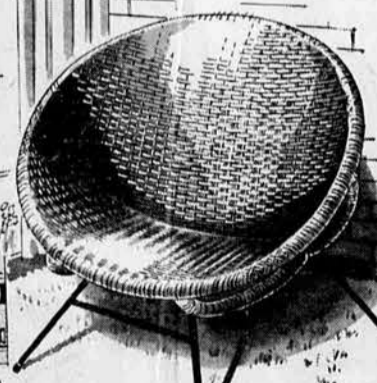

Max Lockwood, superintendent of the Statesboro Recreation Department, announced this week that a new swimming instruction class will begin Monday morning, June 21.

He stated that the demand for swimming instruction was so great that they had to increase their classes. On Monday of this week more than 300 had already registered and more were clamoring to get their names on the list. Of these more than 100 are from the rural sections of the county including 20 from Portal.

He pointed out that new students must register before time for the new classes are set to begin. Registration is at the Recreation Center. New students will not be accepted between classes he said in urging those desiring to take lessons to register immediately.

According to the recreation superintendent there is a ten cent fee per lesson per student, payable each day when the student reports for the instruction period. If he does not report for class he does not have to pay. Instruction will be given three days a week with class periods one hour each. All classes are on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Adults from 9 to 10 a. m. Beginners from 10 to 11 a. m. Intermediates from 11 to 12 o'clock noon.
