## Bids on building for new electronics company run higher than estimates

Bids on the construction of the building for the electronics company planning to establish here were opened at noon last Friday in the county courthouse with representatives of construction, heating, air conditioning, electrical, and plumbing companies from all Georgia present.

Mayor Bill Bowen greeted the representatives of the various companies and extended to them the hospitality of the city.

That J. Morris, president of the Bulloch County Development Corporation, presided at the opening of the bids.

Clous Berghin of Berghin and Berghin Architects of Savannah opened and announced the bids.

With all bids open the low bid on the general contract was \$887,000, which is \$187,000 more than the architects' estimate of \$690,000.

Following the opening of the bids the officers of the development corporation, the engineers who submitted the bids, and officials of the electronics company held a conference and succeeded in bringing down the cost to approximately \$824,000.

According to the contract the company officials with a request that their commitment be made enough to meet the higher cost. If they should agree and go along with the request "then all of the Statesboro officials will have the green light," Mr. Morris added.
