
A lawyer advises you to refuse to sign any paper, document, or other form, unless you are absolutely sure of all the contents of the thing your signature covers.

Word comes to us that relief clients, underprivileged citizens, and others in certain sections of Georgia are being victimized by unscrupulous groups of people who secure property owners' signatures on various pretexts. papers, which turn out to be legal nortgages on their property.

These mortgages are then sold to an innocent third party who then, in time, forecloses and collects on the deal.

Judge Alan Kemper, state welfare director, says that there are several different groups of these "vultures" praying on the unsuspecting and needy people in several sections of the state. The pitch is usually the same.

The property owners, whose records have been checked in the courthouse, are approached by a fast talking operator who points out certain repairs need to be done. They offer to do the work at a "special rate." He represents himself as a friend of the county
