OUR YOUTH... Kemp Mabry

During March of this year more than 1,700 high school students met in a series of five youth conferences throughout the state. The purpose of these conferences was to help young people identify their concerns and problems around topics developed from a grass roots study conducted among youth leaders across the country, and to help the young people decide for themselves some of the answers in the light of Christian ideals and principles. These ten areas were:
1. Conflicts of teenagers and adults.
2. Essentials of mature personality.
3. Christian standards of love and marriage.
4. Building a Christian philosophy of life.
5. The threat of war.
6. Dissolving prejudices.
7. Social adjustments in an unstable world.
8. Making a living.
9. Use of leisure time.
10. The crisis in morals.
In almost any gathering of young people, the adults in the crowd are usually amazed at the honesty and maturity of the response of these teenagers to the discussions of their vital problems and concerns.
The young people respond best under the direction of a competent youth leader who lets the boys and girls speak their honest convictions rather than mouth the sayings of their elders. The key to good youth work anywhere is the adult leader who knows how to draw out the best within the young people, when to remain silent, and the precise moment to provide the seasoning of adult experience.
The results of this pooled thinking seemed to us to be so important and significant that we are putting together a series of articles for publication during the coming weeks which we hope will be beneficial to youth and adults alike.
Did you ever wonder what goes on in the head of a teenage boy or girl? Well, you'll still wonder when we have finished this series but we will have given you what they told us. That should be worth something.

The young people of our community are looking to the adults for leadership and understanding. You can't fool a teenager. They can see right through whatever shams an adult puts up.
Last year we circulated membership applications for a local youth organization, asking the boys to write down the name of the "best" man they knew. We were looking for adult leadership for these boys and we had predicted that one or two men would dominate the results. Instead, there were almost as many "best" men as there were boys polled.
And we remembered what He said about "...whosoever shall offend one of these little ones... it were better for him that a mill stone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea." Taken out of context, perhaps, but sobering enough to cause every adult to think twice before straying from the straight and narrow.

Bulloch farmers rebuild ponds

Mr. Roger Holland, Sr., a cooperator of the Georgia River Soil Conservation District, is rebuilding his dry pond on his farm north of Statesboro near the bulk yard. This pond was built several years back and during dry periods would go down and nearly dry up. This year it went the limit and dried completely up. This dam was built like many old dams—the dirt was pushed in on top of the muck and coarse sand and the water goes out under the dam through the muck and sand. Mr. Holland has gone in with a dragline and bulldozer and cut a core in front of the dam down to clay and back-filled with good clay. It is surprising what is under some of these pond areas. A thick layer of rotten sand was under Mr. Holland's which water could go through like a sieve. We are glad to see Mr. Holland taking steps to conserve his water and fish.
Mr. Lester Ghiff has done a good thing to his pond north of Statesboro just off 301. He drained the water off and with a bulldozer pushed out the sand all around the edges to deepen the edges and make for deep water all over the pond. As I've said many times, this is money well spent. It makes for better weed control, better fishing and a more beautiful pond.
Mr. Jack Morton has completed a fine dam on his farm just north of Leefield. Mr. Morton, working under many material handicaps, went the limit to make a pond that would work in one place where the dam would go, he had to get a dragline and dig down 18 feet before reaching clay for
