The Good Old Days were never like this! Fifteen (or more) years ago when we started to school up in North Georgia it was a rather difficult adjustment to make when the big boys persisted in beating up all the little boys of which I was one.

Nowadays they provide separate portions of the elementary school playground for the smaller children and those just starting to school in the first grade. The play is well supervised by homeroom teachers.

There are 426 children out at the Mattie Lively School we found out last week. For some time I had wanted to see the new elementary schools we have in Statesboro and Principal John Adams invited us out to look over the new school on the north side of town.

I was interested in the lunchroom (it being lunch time). We found an orderly group eating a good lunch in a well arranged dining room which is separated from the kitchen and cafeteria-style serving corridor. The lunchroom serves 380 students per day.

One of the contributing factors to the good school morale we found in the program of public school music which begins in the first grade and continues through the seventh. Every class has a music period each week under leadership of the public school music teacher.

It is a cooperative effort in which each homeroom teacher supplements this teaching throughout the week, using the song books and recordings which are coordinated. The homeroom has their own record players.

Churches salute their Sunday School teachers

Churches here and there saluted their Sunday School teachers last Sunday. Speeches were made in the teacher's honor—they were extolled and praised. Rightly so, too, for Sunday School teachers serve in a wonderful, self-sacrificing manner.

While they receive no pay in money, their rewards of course are tremendous. Who gets more than studying the Bible to give a Sunday School lesson than the teacher? Of course she or he is not doing the studying for self improvement, but that's exactly what he gets.

Too, a great reward that comes not at once but in later years is living in it. A good Sunday School teacher fills a spot in a youth's life or an adult's life or a child's life that nobody else can take. What greater joy can one feel than to realize that something said on Sunday morning may pop up at a moment when temptation to do wrong is about to get the best of a person?

As we sat in church and heard these well-remembered remarks made about these teachers, we recalled a talk Mr. Frederick Wilson made to the church teachers of Bulloch county. He reminded the teachers that everybody is a teacher—the filling station operator, the storekeeper, the garbage collector, the preacher, the farmer, yes, everybody is a teacher.

But Mr. Wilson explained that what one teacher is not always good. Regarding all teachers and it is important to stop and think what we are teaching for somebody, somewhere is learning either good or bad from us.

Besides everybody's being a teacher, everybody has a religion. Some people's religion is the love of money, love of power, love of status, love of man whose religion is the love of God has the greatest religion of all.

Whatever is one's religion is what a man is teaching. He cannot help it. He does it without even knowing it. So the Christian's religion is one he uses every day in the week. It isn't a Sunday religion that hangs on a hat rack when church is over and waits another week to be worn. It is a religion that he lives so completely that he is no more conscious of it than he is of breathing. So unconsciously he spreads his religion about just as one spreads germs.
