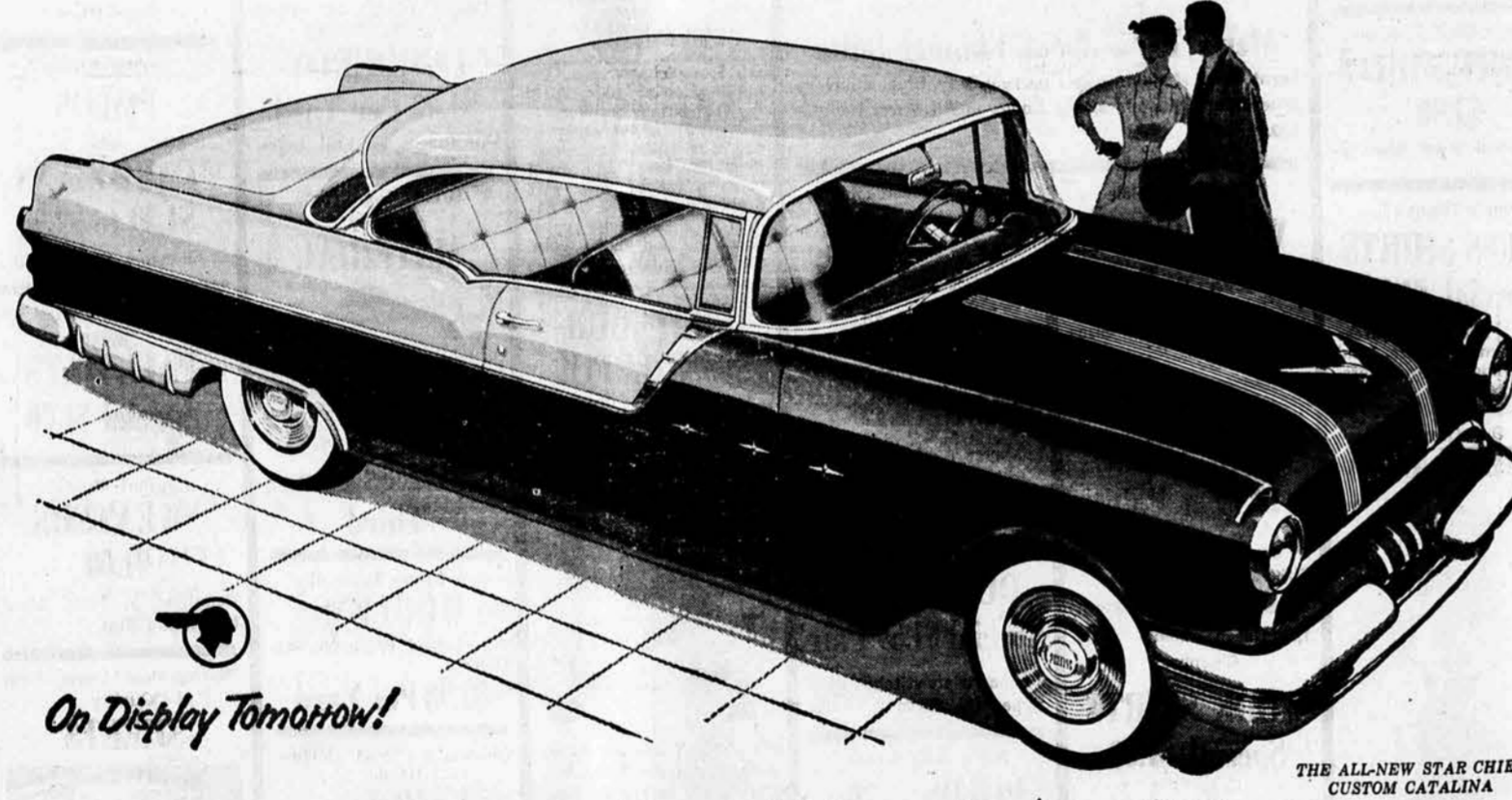

Caplenor Passes, Receives Ph. D.

Charles Donald Caplenor, associate professor of biology, passed the final examination for his doctorate in biology at Vanderbilt, Tennessee last week. This included the defense of his dissertation, entitled "The Vegetation of the Gorges of Fall Creek Falls State Park, Tennessee."

Dr. Caplenor is on the TC faculty.

Preparation of the thesis, which incidentally is the first quantitative study ever made in the vast Mixed Mesophytic Forest region, involved two years of study in the virgin forests of the wild gorges on the north side of the mountain.

The Caplenors have many interesting experiences during their teaching-home-making career. There has been work, but fun, too. All of the family lived in the mountains during part of the study. Here they had no electricity, used charcoal for cooking purposes, and read by kerosene lamps. Right now the professor is in the process of preparing a dissertation for publication in one of the Ecological Journals. Part of it is to be published in the Journal of the Tennessee Academy of Science. His name will appear in the next edition of American Men of Science.

Dr. Caplenor says his chief interests are in teaching, research and photography. And about his likes and dislikes—especially likes people. In speaking of his degrees, he mentions Mrs. Caplenor. "She has helped with them all," he says. "Yes, she has helped a great deal."
