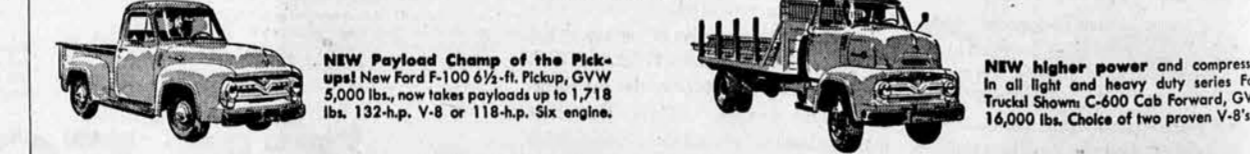

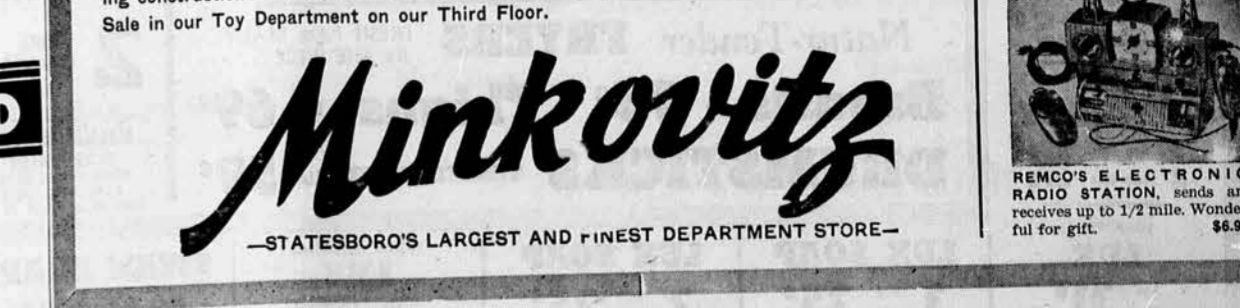

Spanning the fall-flooded Ocmulgee River near Hawkinsville is the unusual Memorial Bridge, over a quarter-mile long, whose paved surface forms the shape of an "S".
