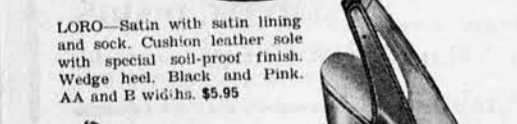

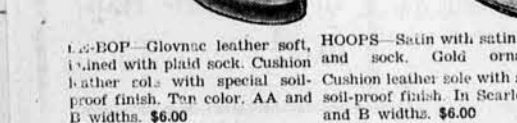

# Farm Bureau



J. H. Wyatt was re-elected president of the Bulloch Farm Bureau Wednesday night. A. J. Woods was elected at Portal Thursday night and L. Herbert Deal remained at Middleground Thursday night.

Mr. Wyatt has his same officers for another year, John N. Rushing Jr., as vice president, and William Cromley as secretary and treasurer.

To work with Mr. Woods the Portal group elected M. L. Taylor vice president, and Billy Brown secretary and treasurer. Middleground remained J. I. Smith vice president and Benny Earl Deal secretary and treasurer.

**BROOKLET FARM BUREAU**  
John C. Cromley, chairman of the county ASC committee, advised the Brooklet chapter that cotton allotment notices were being mailed out and that the voting on quotas for another year would come up December 14. He also stated that they had been advised that there would be a 5 per cent cut in tobacco allotments for 1955.

O. E. Gay, vocational teacher, presented a series of slides on the life cycle of the heel fly and the damage the grubs did to cattle. He recommended that cattlemen use rotenone on their cattle now, either as a spray or dust and rubbed in. Some HBC added to rotenone will help with the lice control efforts, he pointed out.

With a feed shortage facing the local cattlemen, cows will probably have one of the hardest winters in several years to go through. Farmers cannot afford at any time to try feeding and caring for cattle infested with lice, grubs and worms, but this more true with a feed shortage facing them, he stated.

Frank Farr, local accountant, outlined some of the proposed changes in income tax reporting for farmers that would be effective starting January 1, and the need for being ready to take advantage of the social security program farmers would also be under starting this first of the new year. Mr. Farr stated that breeding stock should be listed for a normal life span depreciation in the report next.

## Basketball Band Will Perform At Half-time Shows

The college basketball band will perform only four times at ball games this season due to the limited seating capacity in the gym. The dates they are to perform are December 13, January 22, February 10, and February 19.

The college basketball band is not the full marching band but consists of 16 instrumentalists in the marching band. The seniors in this group plan the program for each ball game and are in charge of rehearsal. They rehearse at 10 o'clock each night in the gym because it is in use at all other times. This arrangement is the only one of its kind in the south.

Miles Frank Deal, county ASC administrative officer, outlined the historical basis for 1955 were used, and again pleaded with cotton growers to turn back to their office any allotments they did not plan to plant so they could be put in the hands of farmers that would plant them. The failure of cotton growers to plant some 1,800 acres in the county this year caused the allotments to be re-allocated considerably.

C. M. Cowart, retiring president of Portal, asked the group present to cooperate with the new officers, especially when membership renewal time came and when projects came up for the group to work with. He enumerated many of the advantages of a farm organization and urged the group to build their chapter stronger.

# Home Accidents Causing Concern

Communities, towns, cities, counties and states are becoming more and more aware of the importance of death and injuries occurring in homes as a result of accidents. The amazing thing about such accidents is that investigations show the vast majority of them to be preventable. Does that seem improbable to you?

Home accidents fall into two main categories: HUMAN factors and environmental factors. Human factors refer to the MENTAL, EMOTIONAL and PHYSICAL state of the individual at the particular moment. For example, an adult could use with safety a house-hold appliance which would be dangerous in the hands of a small child. A 16-year-old boy could, without to great a risk, climb a tree or a high ladder that would be dangerous for his grandfather. Adults and youngsters alike, when upset, or angry, or tired, are prone to become involved in accidents.

Environmental factors refer to a wide range of conditions and one's home and its environs, which contribute to accidents. An untidy house, with objects scattered on the floor for people to stumble over would be a simple yet dangerous environmental hazard contributing to an accident. Most home accidents are probably caused by a combination of both the human and environmental factors.

Your local health department personnel have been studying causative factors and preventive measures so that they can tell the members of the families of Bulloch county. More and more will be heard by the public about the important subject because we feel that most home accidents causing deaths, crippling conditions and just a few hours of inconvenience can be prevented. Public health people, and in fact the entire community, care and should be interested in the prevention when it comes to home accidents.

There are probably more than 100 major injuries. Think of the pain, the blood, the hospital and medical bills, absence from school for these children, just to mention a few of the inconveniences, a word which is certainly an understatement.

We want you to memorize, yes actually memorize the more important causes of home accidents. They are (1) BURNS AND EXPLOSIONS (2) FALLS, (3) MECHANICAL SUFFOCATION, (4) FIRE, (5) POISONS. Difficult to remember? No.

Watch this paper for detailed breakdowns of CAUSATIVE FACTORS and PREVENTIVE MEASURES. The reduction of home accidents can only be possible if each individual learns the facts and applies them to himself, home, and family. Yours is the responsibility to digest the material and then make it an everyday living experience. It's easy to do.

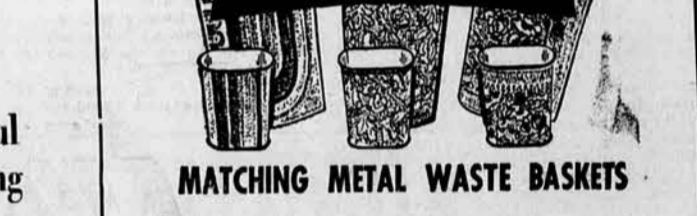
