Bulloch farmers happy to see 1954 go; now looking to 1955

The Georgia agricultural outlook in printed form will be available at all the Farm Bureau meetings in January. A copy may also be procured now at the county agent's office.

Most Bulloch county farmers are happy to see 1954 go. They are looking forward to getting started on another year, maybe one that will see the normal rainfall reach about the usual 50 inches instead of about half that amount. They hope for a distribution of the rainfall that will prove more satisfactory to adequate plant growth.

The 1955 agricultural outlook calls for a year of no mistakes. Coupled with the adverse year just finished, the high investment cost and high cash outlay of modern farming gives them every reason to believe they can't afford to make any mistakes.

It costs more to farm than industry invests per man, about twice as much. A farm takes an average investment of some \$20,000 per worker.

Farmers are more dependent than ever on manufactured items, like machinery, gasoline, oil, fertilizers, and building materials. These items will probably cost three times as much per unit as they did in 1941.

Such costs don't leave much room for management errors. Farmers can't afford the risks. Farming is hazardous enough without them, as local farmers

found out in 1954.

The 1955 outlook will give the predictions for the year, based on a grouping of facts related to the various enterprises. However, these facts will also have to be integrated with the best known research data and observations from practices carried out by other successful farmers in this area in making crop and livestock production plans and in using their soil, equipment, and labor to best advantage.

The Bulloch county farmer today is called on to be an expert technician in all sorts of fields. He has to be economist enough to know when to buy and sell, engineer enough to operate thousands of dollars worth of machinery, mechanic enough to repair it, be a veterinarian, entomologist, and agronomist. The 1955 outlook indicates that there will not be any place in the program for a patchwork approach to the various problems he faces in this year.

The day when all the available information on any one enterprise was all that was needed to do a good job with it have gone. He has to weigh a lot of other factors on related enterprises and then work out a farm-management pattern to cover all the enterprises used on Bulloch county farms.

Whole-farm planning will be used more in 1955 than ever before. Faulty planning will not have any place in the picture. Economists feel that the

farmer that uses efficiency, especially sound farm management, on all crop enterprises should find 1955 about as 1954, as far as demand for farm products and net returns are concerned.

But there cannot be any mistakes in 1955. The margins will be too close.

Results from demonstrations within the county will be discussed from time to time at the Farm Bureau meetings. Short courses or clinics held when needed. A series of short courses have been planned at Abraham Baldwin College for January and February that will help materially, if attended.

The subjects for these one-day short courses are farm credit January 7, sweet potatoes on January 13, tractors and equipment on January 14, cucumbers, watermelons and cantaloupes on January 18, cotton on January 21, soils and fertilizers on January 27, and land judging and utilization on January 28. Then in February dairying on February 1, bankers farm credit on February 2 and 3, the use of electricity on farms on February 10, farm machinery maintenance on February 14 and 15, pastures on February 17, beef cattle on February 18, swine on February 22, and home crafts on February 24 and 25.

The best subject matter specialists in the various fields involved will conduct these short courses at Tifton.
