Ga.'s new 'Livestock Law'now is effective in Bulloch county

approved December 22, 1953, went into effect in Bulloch county on January 1, 1955.

The new law, according to Section 12, reads: "Any owner of livestock who unlawful or intentionally or knowingly permits the same to

ment."

The law went into effect in Bulloch county on January 1, 1955, following recommendations made by the July and October, 1954 terms of the Bulloch county grand jury.

The law defines "livestock" as "all animals of the equine,

bovine or swine class, including goats, sheep, mules, horses, hogs, cattle and other grazing

Owners are defined as "any person, association, firm or corporation, natural or artificial, owning or having custory of or in charge of livestock."







