





To most people of Statesboro the fire whistle and the fire engine siren only means that there's a fire somewhere and the fire department is off to it.

To a few-a very few-the fire whistle and the fire engine siren means more than there's just a fire and that the fire department is off to it. To these few it means that, with the first shrill whistle and the first high whine of the siren, they must relinquish the right of way-make way for the fire trucks and so they pull their cars off to the nearest curb immediately.

Near tragedy stalks the streets of Statesboro every time there's a fire. A car driver pulls away from the curb to get into the traffic with the fire truck bearing down on him, because he did not heed the siren and remain at the curb until the fire engines were well away. Polio is a bigger job now!

On January 3, the annual March of Dimes began its drive for polio-fighting funds. While the year just ending has witnessed giant strides against this crippling disease, victory is not yet won.

The trial vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas E. Salk was given last spring to 440,000 children. Now an evaluation of its effectiveness in prevention polio paralysis is being made at the University of Michigan. Health records of 1,830,000 children in the first three grades of 14,000 schools in the 217 trial areas are being studied.
