"The teacher supply situation in Georgia has been declared the worst in the state's history and one of the worst existing in any state in the nation at this time," Dr. Park said. "There was an overall increase of 16 per cent in college and university enrollment, the figure for qualified teachers dropped."

He pointed out, it is the problem facing school administrators.

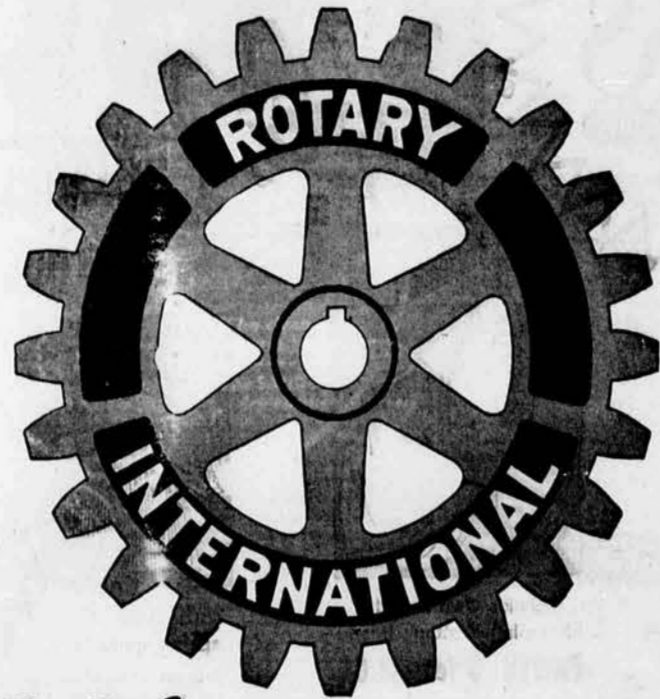
