A Statement To The People of Statesboro Regarding The Natural Gas System Election

On Tuesday, April 19, 1955

The Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Statesboro are happy to announce that for the first time in the history of our city we now have been allotted an ample supply of natural gas for our homes and our industry.

In the faith that an overwhelming majority of our people want a municipal natural gas distribution system, we have spent many hours of hard work in successfully prosecuting the city's application for natural gas before the Federal Power Commission in Washington. We have the allotment.

We believe that the most progressive step which our city has had the opportunity of making in the last 25 years is the installation of this municipal natural gas distribution system.

It was our duty to obtain this supply of gas, but we cannot install the pipe lines and other facilities to make it available until we are authorized to do so by a vote of the people in the election called for that purpose to be held on April 19, 1955, at the county courthouse. We recommend this system to you and request that you vote for it in this election.

Before we can proceed one step further this program must be approved in this election. The law requires that a majority of the qualified registered voters vote in this election, and that the majority of these voting must vote for the municipal system.

But whether you favor or oppose the system, we urge that you vote in this election. It would be a great embarrassment to our city if the majority of the people failed to vote in it, because it would demonstrate that a greater part of our people are not sufficiently interested in progressive government to participate in it.

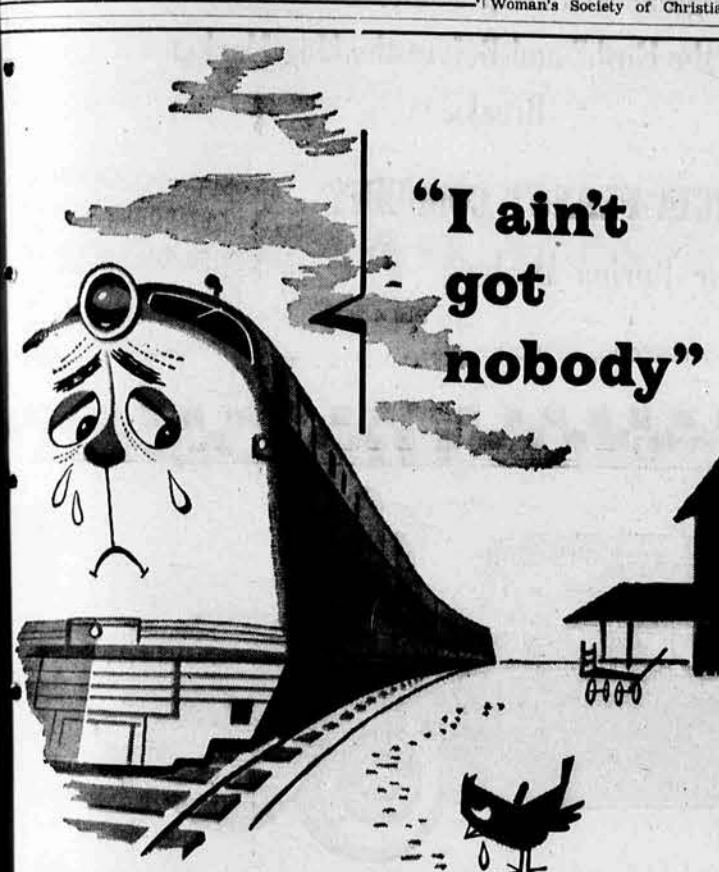

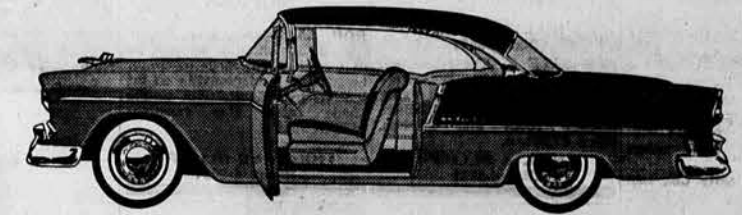

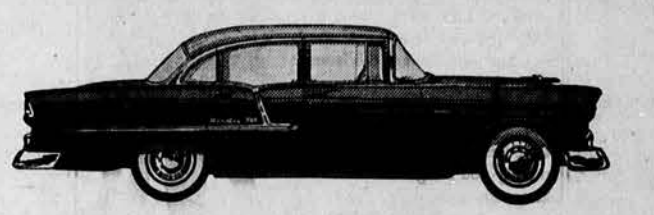
