The All-American was selected from more than 450 institutions and from more than four thousand

This superb basketball player has broken every basketball scoring record in our college's history. During 1954-55 season he ran up a total of 792 points. He scored 47 points against Piedmont College on January 6 of this year. He holds a total of 1,657 points over his three seasons here. He has 281 field goals to his credit for the 1954-55 season, and has an average of 28.3 points per game for the season.

To symbolize his All-American rating he will be presented with an award certificate and a diamond-studded gold gasketball at the annual all-sport banquet at the college on May 17. His picture will be placed in the Sports Hall of Fame building in Los Angeles.




