Is youthful 'business enterprise' so important?

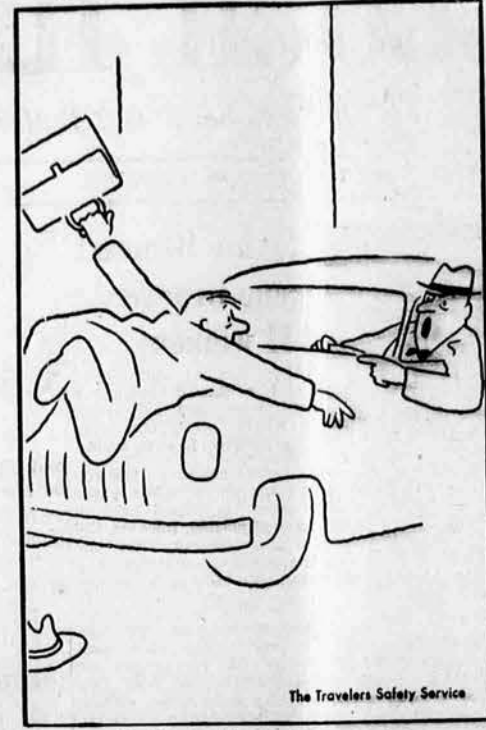
One told us he is eight years old. The other told us he is seven years. There are some who would commend these children for their "business enterprise," but we're not so sure.
