



In his column on this page, "It Seems to Me," Mr. Lockwood is focusing the spotlight on the problem of juvenile delinquency.

We know of no one in our community, and few in the state, who is as close to our youth as this young man, Max Lockwood.

He contends that no concerted effort of lasting consequence has been made on the state level to really solve the problem, either on behalf of the states or by any responsible organization.

He admits that he is no authority on what are the underlying causes of juvenile delinquency, but because of his close contact with the young people he does have a conception of the tremendous problems which evolve them.

In his first letter to Congressman Preston he makes the point that up to now all the efforts have been toward curing the disease with little thought being given to the preventative side.

He believes that the creation of a State Recreation Commission is one of the best approaches toward helping the communities help themselves

A great portion of the work now handled in Atlanta can be handled with more economy in Savannah. The crime lab will provide the equipment necessary for conviction of crime. Photographic supplies, microscopes, ballistics equipment and other accessories needed for scientific examination will be there. The laboratory will be staffed with competent personnel to aid all law enforcement officers in the detection, arrest and prosecution of criminals in this section of the state.

The steady growth of this section of the state and the increasing burden of police work made the location of the crime laboratory in Savannah desirable and necessary.

The general uniformity of the crop will let you pack your tobacco in larger piles. By so doing you will help relieve some of the market congestion. The buyers have a preference for the larger piles, so try to pack them up to the 300-pound maximum. The space you thus save will enable your neighbor to get his tobacco on the floor and you will save selling charges!
