They adopted a dangerous resolution

The State Board of Education met Monday, August 1, in Waynesboro and adopted a resolution seeking the resignation of all teachers in Georgia who are members of the NAACP...

Constitutional rights, personal privileges and individual thoughts. It follows as night follows day that if our State Board of Education succeeds in making this resolution stick they can, just by resolution, revoke a teacher's license for being a Catholic, a Republican, or any other organization which the board may fail to approve.

A lot of us do not approve of the NAACP organization, its leaders and the methods it uses in attaining the things for which it stands. Its political and social aims are not ours and we disapprove of them, but this does not make it an illegal organization.

When the members of the board adopted that resolution they could not have realized the storm they were brewing about their heads.

The Atlanta Council of United Church Women opposed the board's action in a resolution which "reaffirms our faith in public schools, in academic freedom, and in the loyalty, integrity and ability of our teachers without regard to race or creed..."

Two days before the Bishop Randolph R. Claiborne Jr. of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta denounced the board's resolution.

We commend these two actions and would that more organizations and persons were more outspoken about this invasion of our

But the question of segregation is not a part of the issue set up by the board's action in Waynesboro. Basically it is an invasion of individual rights.

Their action is a dangerous one. Many people are firm in their stand for segregation in our schools. And these same people are just as firm in their determination to preserve the political freedom and individual liberties of our citizens.

HOW TO PLANT ALFALFA. Agricultural Extension Service agronomists say that, in planting alfalfa, 25 to 35 pounds of inoculated seed per acre should be used. They recommend planting in September or early October. Use grain drill with grass seeding attachment or cyclone seeder. Roll with mulch harrow and cover before sun kills inoculation.

CONTROL OF BLOSSOM-END ROT. Control of blossom-end rot of tomatoes can best be attained if irrigation is available, according to Agricultural Extension Service horticulturist. Mulching also is very helpful because it conserves moisture. Plants which have received either too much or too little nitrogen are usually more susceptible, the specialists say.

LEMNADONE powder is the latest of the fruit preservatives developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, according to Agricultural Extension Service nutritionists.



Tuesday was "Heart" day, and the topic was "Loyalty to Ourselves, Our Families, Our State and Country." This discussion was led by County Agent F. R. Spence and M. C. Little, and was followed by an address by Mr. E. J. Richardson, State 4-H Club leader from the University of Georgia.

Wednesday was "Hands" day, and the topic was "Rendering Service With Our Hands." This discussion was led by County Agent J. W. Horne and the address was by Mr. H. H. Dudley, businessman and civic leader of Dublin, Georgia.

Thursday was "Health" day, and the discussion was "Helping to Build a Healthier America." This discussion was led by County Agents E. S. Spikes and E. R. Gay, and the address following was by Dr. W. A. Watkins, M. D., Dublin, Georgia.

Friday was "4-H Motto" day. The discussion was "Making the Best Better," which was led by Mrs. Thelma P. Wright, County Agent R. T. Church and M. C. Little. This was followed by an address by Mr. W. A. Sutton, associate director, Agricultural Extension Service, University of Georgia.
