FOR THE FIRST time in seven years the Statesboro Blue Devils defeated the Vidalia High School Indians in a football game, Sunday night, September 24, to the tune of 7 to 0. It was the first time in three years that Statesboro has been able to score a touchdown against the Vidalia Indians. The lone touchdown came in the second period as a result of a pass from J. A. Cone to Gene L. Hodges. This play put the ball in scoring position and on the next play J. A. Cone drove to the two-yard line and David Barnes, the powerful fullback, smashed the center of the line to score. He repeated the play to make the extra point. The game ended 7 to 0. "Stag" Johnson was the coach that year.

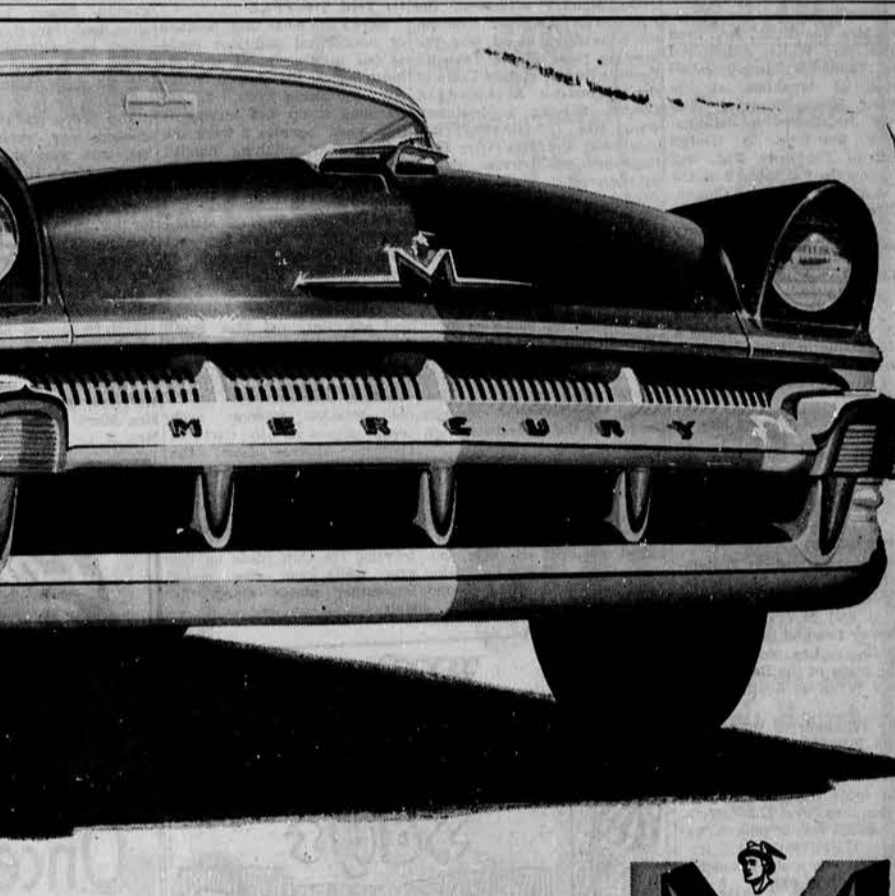
