But street corners in our residential sections on which shrubbery or trees grow are allowed to remain and they stand as constant hazards to traffic.

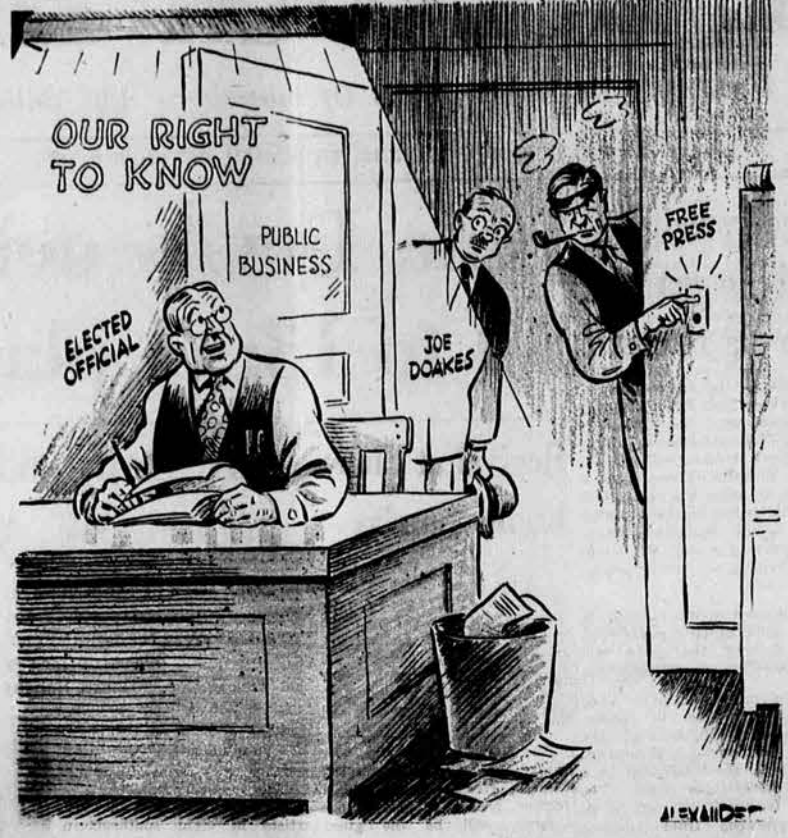
An accident occurs and a "reason" offered is in many cases "obstructed vision." The driver complains that he or she "just didn't see the other car coming."
