**Local board reminds young men to register**  
 The Bulloch County Local Board states that many young men who were serving in the armed forces at the time they were due to register have since been discharged from the service, but have failed to register. Although these young men are not subject to being drafted, under present regulations, they are still obligated to be registered or to re-register within 30 days after discharge from the service. Some young men have the mistaken idea that if they are a member of the National Guard or other reserve organization it eliminates the necessity of registering. These young men are required to register within five days after becoming eighteen years of age. Under the Selective Service Act of 1948 ALL young men born on or after August 30, 1922, are required to register at their nearest Local Board. Failure to comply with the act by not registering promptly will leave the Local Board applying special techniques to active or more professional looking garments, making a cottey, rayon, or wool dress can teach tailoring just as well as making a coat or suit." ## News From Collegeboro to keep post office

There will be no change in the status of the Collegeboro post office. Postmaster Z. Strange was informed Wednesday by a telegram from the Washington, D. C. office of Senator Walter F. George.

The news came after a week of desperate effort in the Mr. Strange and President Henderson to avert the closing of the college's postoffice.

A letter from the postmaster general received recently indicated that the postoffice was to be discontinued as such in an economy move by the administration. The plans would have called for a "contract" system mail delivered at the college, with the mail handlers here merely being the lowest bidders for the job rather than subqualified civil service persons.

Three Deliveries  
 Mr. Strange told The Georgian that such a system probably would have meant only one or two mail deliveries a day and these deliveries would have been delayed by about 12 hours. As it is, there are three deliveries and three dispatches each day.

President Henderson and the postmaster immediately got off letters and phone calls to postal inspectors, senators, and congressmen, requesting that the proposed move be considered. Final confirmation that no action would be taken came from Senator George.

## Rep. Preston to urge 90 percent farm parity

Congressman Prince H. Preston will again urge that the U. S. Senate pass a 90 per cent parity bill when he appears at a hearing of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee in Macon on Saturday.

The First District representative, who is a member of the powerful Appropriations Committee of the House, introduced HR 15 to guarantee 90 per cent of parity on basic crops during the past session of Congress. The House passed by a close vote a 90 per cent parity bill embodying the provisions of the Preston bill and this proposed legislation now awaits Senate action in the next session of Congress, which convenes in January.

A special subcommittee of the Senate Agriculture Committee has been taking testimony on farm legislation for the past several weeks and meets in Macon for this purpose on Saturday.

In his office in Statesboro today, Congressman Preston stated: "I will continue my efforts to obtain legislation guaranteeing a 90 per cent parity for basic crops. Our national welfare demands that our farmers be assured of a more equitable share of the nation's prosperity."





# Editorials

## For unrestricted and more free city elections

Back in 1912 the Georgia Legislature specified the method of electing the mayor and council of Statesboro. This act read as follows:

"Section 4—The general election for mayor and councilmen shall be held on the first Saturday in December, 1912, and on the first Saturday in December thereafter as follows: The first election under the charter to be held on the first Saturday in December, 1912, shall be for the election of the mayor and five councilmen, the mayor and two councilmen to be elected for a period of two years from said date and three said councilmen to be elected for a period of one year from said date, and until their successors are elected and qualified, after which time the mayor and two councilmen shall be elected biannually for a period of two years and three said councilmen shall be elected the year thereafter for a period of two years, so that the terms of the mayor and councilmen shall expire the year thereafter."

Later this act was amended to change the date of our city election but that is not what we are leading up to.

Our understanding of the method of electing our city mayor and city councilmen during these years is that for each election as many candidates as wished could qualify and when the votes cast for each candidate were counted the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes were elected to fill the two vacancies. If it were a year when three councilmen were to be elected then the three candidates receiving the three highest number of votes were the winners.

On December 17, 1948 when the late A. J. Trapnell and A. S. Dodd Jr. were Bulloch county representatives in the Georgia Legislature they introduced a bill which amended our charter which read as follows:

"Section 9—That the city charter of the City of Statesboro is hereby amended by adding a new section to be known as section 81 and reading as follows:

"Section 81. Be it further enacted that from and after the passage of this act all candidates for election for membership in the City Council of the City of Statesboro shall at the time of his qualification for said

office, ANNOUNCE THE NAME OF THE INCUMBENT AGAINST WHOM HE IS RUNNING, OR THE PARTICULAR SEAT ON SAID CITY COUNCIL WHICH HE SEEKS TO FILL, AND SAID CANDIDATE IS HEREBY REQUIRED TO RUN AGAINST A PARTICULAR CHOSEN OPPOSITE OR INCUMBENT OR FOR A PARTICULAR SEAT"

Section 10—That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act be, and the same are hereby repealed."

The act was approved February 1, 1949.

This sets up the background for what we are about to say. We do not know why this change was made in our election procedure. But to us it seems without reason. It suggests to us that it was passed to limit the field of candidates in our city council elections. It suggests to us that a worthy citizen who might consider becoming a candidate would refrain from becoming one since he would have to pick out a single candidate, either the incumbent or another candidate, against who he must run.

In the past we have heard citizens who considered becoming a candidate say that when they learned that they must say against whom they must run they back away and give up the prospect of offering for election. The prospective candidate refused to run against a certain incumbent "because he is a friend of mine." Adding however that if he could run against the field where the two or three receiving the highest number of votes would be the winners, he would become a candidate.

And that makes sense. In a community like ours where friendships are considered valuable it goes against a man's grain to be put in such a position.

We believe that if our method of election were as it was before the Act of 1949 we would see more worthy citizens become interested in seeking the responsibilities of city government.

We believe our present representatives in the Legislature would be doing our city a great service to introduce a bill at the next session of the Georgia Assembly to amend our charter making our city election more open, more free and unrestricted.


