





Sidewalks for school children important

It's an overworked statement but one that bears repeating time after time-If the life of one child can be saved then the effort and cost are more than worth it.

We're back on the problem of sidewalks for the kids who attend our two elementary schools, the Sallie Zetterower and the Mattie

Of the more than 450 pupils attending the Mattie Lively school about 50 have to walk and about the same number ride bicycles. Of the 460 kids enrolled at the Sallie Zetterower about 75 walk to school and about the same number ride bicycles.

And those walking to these two schools have to walk in the streets and highways.

One child has been hit on the road leading to the Mattie Lively school while walking on his way to school.

Our children should not be subjected to the extreme hazards of having to walk in our streets while on their way to and from our

We've improved our sidewalks in the business sections of the city to reduce the walking hazards for our citizens and to keep them in a more receptive mood for the sales pitch of our merchants.

.To us it's infinitely more important to provide for the safety of those children who must walk to school and the additional children who would walk to school if dewalks were provided.

And these sidewalks need not be ncrete right now-just dirt sidewalks to remove the necessity of using the streets and roads. This should be tended to before it's too late.
