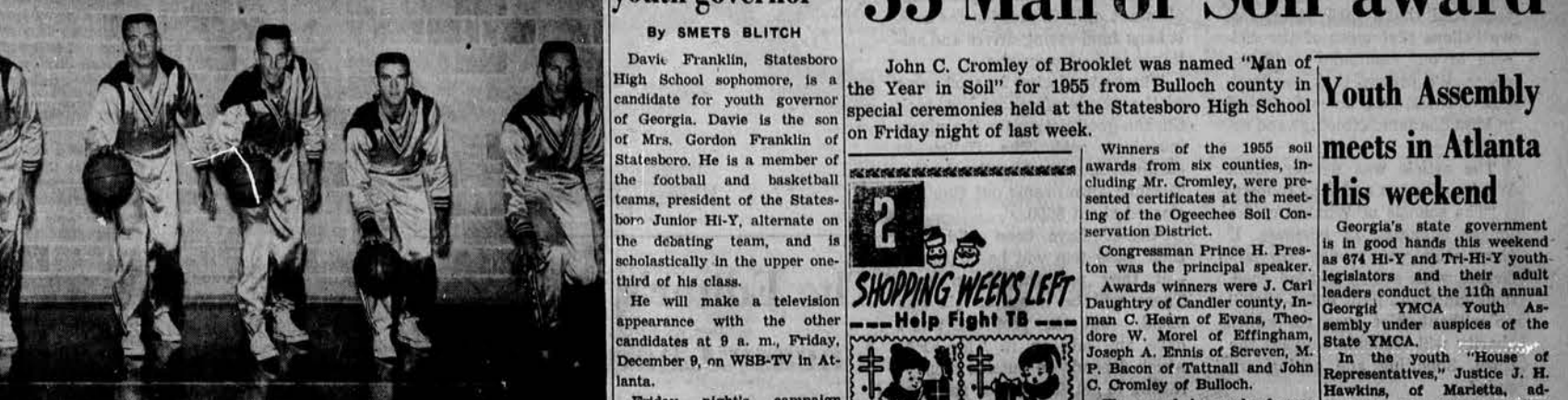

## A Georgia city makes a bold move

In a recent edition of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution Margaret Shannon wrote an article with which we are heartily in agreement. Believing that it will find response in the hearts of many parents and school children in Statesboro and Bulloch county we are reprinting it here.

We know that there will be some to raise their voices in protest. And that's their right. But we believe that most of the citizens of our community will approve. We believe that our businessmen will find home for relief in Miss Shannon's findings and report.

The article was written from Windsor, Georgia and is as follows: "The schools of Windsor are no longer engaging in business. If they can't get money for activities with selling garden seed, doughnuts and light bulbs, they'll do without. Not even for sweet charity will students canvass the town. Soliciting and selling are ended."

"To Superintendent D. F. Osborne, it's a relief.

"The decision to take the schools out of business was made by the Windsor board of education and handed to Mr. Osborne as a set policy to enforce. It gives him a firm method of resisting the blandishments of all who would use pupils as peddlers.

"We started a year ago," the superintendent said. "We used to have a king and queen for our Halloween carnival, and a penny was a vote. Well, people were pestered to death for pennies. You can make \$700 or \$800 on that kind and queen proposition. But we quit it a year ago."

"The idea of stopping all student solicitation developed gradually. Seniors sold doughnuts last year for their class trip to Washington. They didn't zone the town, and as a result, many doors were knocked on four or five times in an afternoon. People began yelling for help.

## Ray services to be changed

A mass group tuberculosis ray services by the mobile unit of the State Health Department will be replaced in January, 1956, by a system which will concentrate on individuals that have been exposed to or have symptoms of tuberculosis.

In announcing the change, H. C. Schenk, director of the Health Department, explained that the new plan will offer x-ray service to those persons who are not being x-rayed in the regular county health department clinics.

Previously, the mobile units were scheduled to visit schools for industrial for mass x-ray services. However, it was found that there were twice as many people in the general public than in the industrial workers, and nearly seven times as many of those of school and college groups, Dr. Schenk said.

With only three mobile units which are capable of processing a total of only 150,000 x-rays annually, it is impossible to x-ray the entire state population. According to the new plan, more selective, it is expected to locate more causes of tuberculosis than the former plan.

The county health department will schedule visits of the mobile units through the regional health departments. Those following will be urged to have x-rays by the units:

- (1) Those who have a cough long duration, repeated influenza attacks, pneumonia, pharyngitis, fever and prolonged sweats, and other signs of disease in the chest or unexplained ill health.
- (2) Those who have had contact with cases of tuberculosis.
- (3) Those who have taken a tuberculin test and have reacted to it.

## Not So Long Ago

The Bulloch Herald, 1937

BULLOCH COUNTY'S FIRST LYING-IN BY GENE FLETCHER The first lying-in that happened in Bulloch county was when they hung a white man named Johnson, who was charged with horse stealing.

The lynching was done some time late in the 1880's and the location of the same was in what was then known as "The Sweet Gum Flat," a flat where the Savannah road passes through a sweet gum flat, near where the overgrown avenue connects with Savannah avenue, on the property now owned by the Presbyterian Church.

Johnson was taken to "Uncle" Jake Newby's boarding house, where he was treated to a hearty supper, given all the whiskey he wanted to drink and then he was taken to the gallows to be hanged.

They rode him on horseback down to the sweet gum flat, and under a persimmon tree that stood by the side of the road, with a large limb extending over the road, they fastened one end of the rope around his neck, and threw the other end of it over the limb, and dancing to the music of "we will hang old Johnson on a persimmon tree," they led the horse out under him.

Of course he choked to death. His corpse was allowed to hang there until the next day,

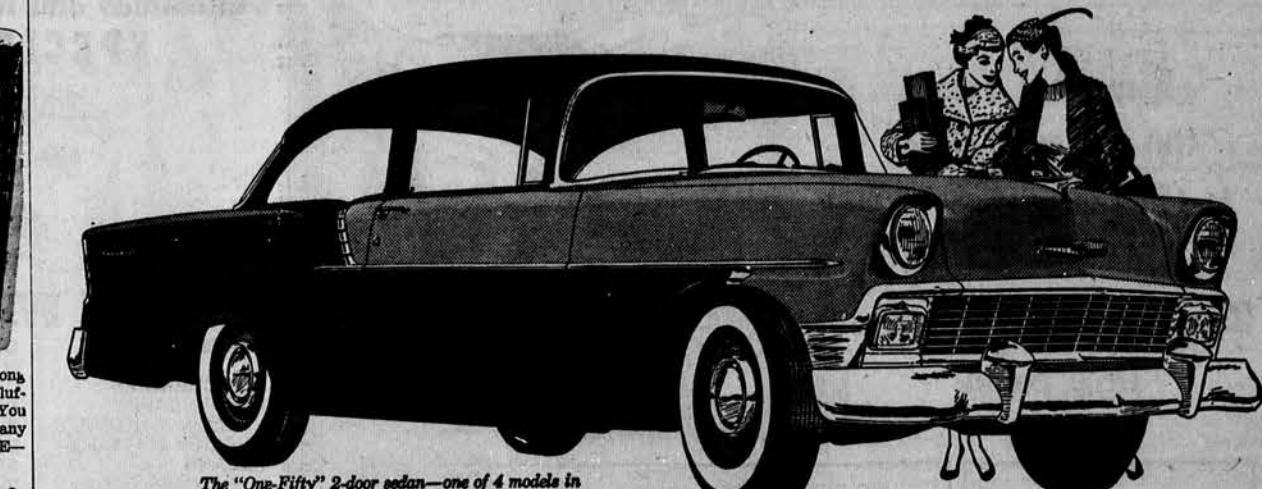
