Ga. Power Gov. Griffin praises Georgia school construction program

The Georgia Power Company's tax payments on property in Bulloch county for 1955 total \$13,297.71. It was announced today by W. Tom Martin, district manager, Mr. Griffin said checks are being delivered to county and city officials this week of this amount, \$2,118,000 to the county and \$11,179.71 to the city.

Municipal taxes are paid to Bulloch County and Statesboro. The company's property tax payments throughout Georgia amount to \$4,145,000. Of this amount, \$2,118,000 goes to the county, \$1,927,000 to school districts, \$62,000 to cities and towns, and \$23,000 to the state.

Municipal partnership tax amounts to 3 per cent of gross receipts from the sale of electricity for residential and commercial use within incorporated communities, amounting to \$1,948,000. These payments are made earlier in the year and were in addition to property tax payments. The number of municipalities sharing in these payments was 342.

Mr. Martin said approximately 20 per cent of the company's total revenue goes to pay taxes, including federal and state income taxes, property taxes, gross receipts taxes and others.

Gov. Griffin praises Georgia school construction program

The University System Building Authority Thursday was described by Gov. Marvin Griffin as one of the most progressive moves ever made in the field of higher education in Georgia.

The governor was speaking at dedication ceremonies for the new health and education building at Georgia Teachers College here last Thursday night, Dec. 8.

The building program, Griffin said, "has brought to our institutions structures which have been needed for many years. The added facilities will enable the faculties and the student bodies to get fuller benefit from college education than they have in the past."

Under the authority, the University System has added 44 new buildings at a total cost of a little more than 20 million dollars, the governor noted, and there are two more under construction—at the University of Georgia, Athens, and the medical school in Augusta.

The new GTC building is the largest structure at the school where people may be assembled as it has a seating capacity of 3,500. It also has a completely equipped gymnasium. It was built at a cost, including equipment, of 320,000.

Chester Webb, the Helms Foundation All-American selection, took up where he left off last year, scoring 45 points on 13 baskets and 19 free throws in 21 attempts.

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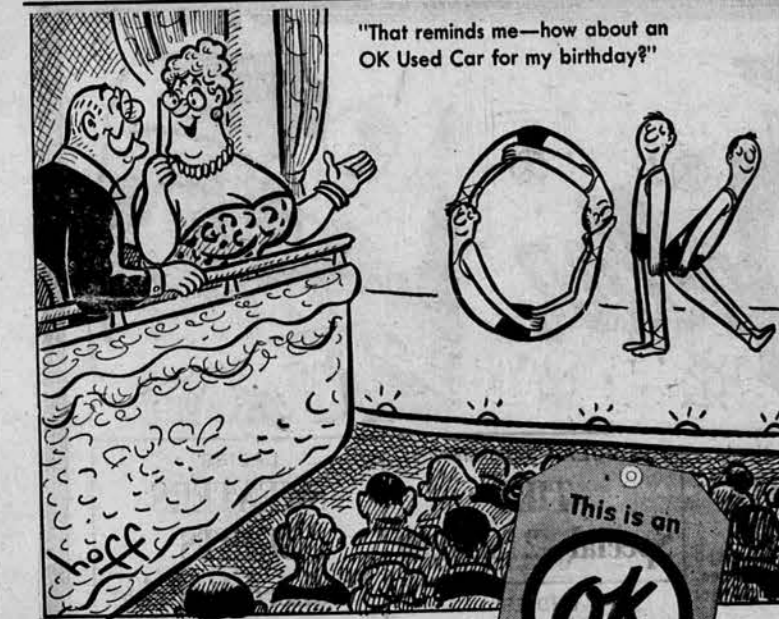

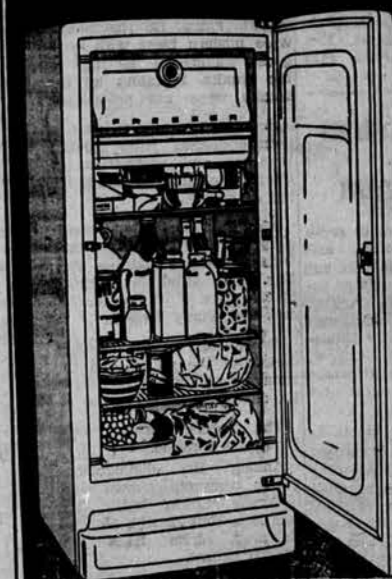
