If you are not going to be home during the hours of 7 'till 9 p. m., just leave the clothes on the porch and a Jaycee will get them.



TERE IS A STORY that has come down **I** to us through centuries of war and peace and life and death as an eternal message of hope and faith. It has been told and told again in diverse languages and strange tongues, yet it has remained forever the same-the simple story of a King among men.


