Denmark FB members study value of chlordan

Denmark had its first covered dish supper at the Farm Bureau meeting Tuesday night and the large number present seemed to like the idea.

The value of chlordan in the tobacco transplanting water to control worms was discussed at Denmark. It was pointed out that under tobacco probably more good could be secured for such insects as wire worms with the insecticide than by using it mixed in the fertilizer.

Normally, rainfall starts developing by some moisture collecting around small dust particles up where the temperature is around minus 40 degrees. Just under this extreme cold area is generally an area in the clouds that runs from minus 27 degrees on to around freezing.

seeding will produce from three to 17 per cent more moisture from the cloud than would normally fall, Mr. Barreback declared.

SINKHOLE Carlton Kirby, assistant county agent, gave a flannelgraph talk at the Sinkhole meeting on Thursday night on controlling roaches.

Mr. Kirby pointed out in his talk that roaches could be controlled in the house and around buildings with chlordan if the areas where roaches nest is sprayed thoroughly.

He advised the group that a livestock clinic was being planned for the county on March 28. The clinic was requested along with the other short courses held recently on crops but specialists to conduct the clinic were not available until the latter part of March.

The winning applicant must be of good character with a pleasing personality. He must show a sincere desire to follow the forestry profession and have the ability to do creditable college work. He must have a better than average scholastic record and demonstrated leadership ability in school and other community activities.

Application forms and additional information about the scholarship may be obtained by applicants from local high school principals or vocational agriculture teachers. The completed forms must be submitted to local high school principals not later than April 15, 1956.

Applicants from each school will be screened in May, and the two scholarship winners will be selected from the group by the Awards Committee in June, 1956.

The committee for Georgia and South Carolina is composed of Dean D. J. Weddell, School Forestry, University of Georgia, chairman; Guyton DeLoach, director, Georgia Forestry Commission; J. J. Macomber, forester and general manager, Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association and an executive officer of Gair Woodlands Corporation.

GTC Professors lose second round in NAIA tourney in KC

After surviving the first round of the NAIA basketball tournament in Kansas City by defeating Southeastern Oklahoma, 81 to 78 on Monday last week, GTC ran into one of the best basketball teams in the country on Wednesday night and lost to Pittsburgh State, a teachers college from Southeast Kansas, by a score of 99 to 72, which eliminated them from the NAIA's 1956 tournament.

Even in defeat, Coach J. B. Seawear was not greatly upset. In two games here, his club had defeated a tough South-eastern Oklahoma five and lost to a team that had been unbeaten only once in 23 starts. The experience gained by the Prof's against those tough Louisiana foes was regarded by Seawear as invaluable.

Seawear feels that Pittsburgh State is a fine team and that the caliber of opposition the Kansas have encountered this season has added immeasurably to their sharpness and court savvy.

This is his critique on that Wednesday night contest: "They (Pittsburgh) defend you differently. They work a lot harder at it and stick you all the time. They were awfully hot. It's not so much that they were getting good shots but that they were hitting from outside on whatever they shot."

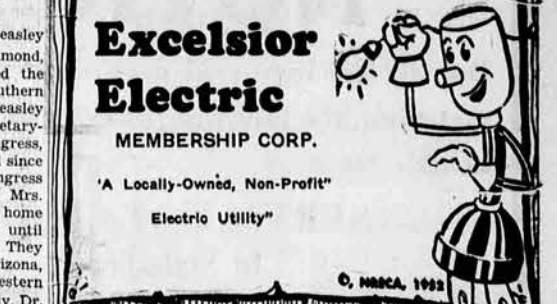
