# Report on Rockwell Manufacturing Co.

For those who entertained certain qualms about the Rockwell Manufacturng Company who bought the building constructed by the Bulloch County Development Corporation and now to be occupied by the Rockwell Statesboro Corporation, there comes information which should clear up their cloudy feelings.

We have just received the statement of Willard F. Rockwell Jr., president of the Rockwell Manufacturing Company, including the company's annual report.

Mr. Rockwell reports 1955 shipments up \$6,500,000 to \$82,947,000 -an increase of eight and onehalf per cent over 1954-and orders up \$13,500,000 to \$88,200,-000, an 18 per cent gain.

Net earnings were \$6,794,000, equal to \$3.61 per share, as compared wth \$5,724,000 or \$3.04 in 1954—a gain of 19 per cent. Profits before income taxes in-

creased \$1,617,000 to a total of

Orders during the company's fourth quarter were booked at an annual rate in excess of \$100,000,-000-and the improvement has continued during early 1956. The backlog of unfilled orders at the end of the year was approximately \$13,000,000 — up 70 per cent from the first of the year.

The company is in a strong financial condition with net working capital up \$2,780,000 to a total of \$33,900,000. Cash increased almost \$700,000 to a total balance of \$7,600,000 at the end of the year-exceeding the total of all liabilities. Sounds good to us.




