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

About 3,000 automobile and truck owners in Bulloch county have not yet secured their 1956 auto tags or truck tags.

John P. Lee, tax commissione of Bulloch county, says that as of April 2, his office had issued 6,216 tags which, according to him, is about 3,000 short of what should be issued

He reports that as far as his office is concerned the new law requiring auto and truck owners buy their tags on the local level has worked out to the advantage of the county. According to his figures he has collected three times more tax money up through March of this year than he had at the same date last year.


We are triply pleased: first, for Miss Crouch; second, for the First District; and third, because we had some small part in the selection.
