The stage presented the facade of an old southern home, complete with four newly painted columns of Georgia, and the doorway and glass panels were authentic with white shutters on each side.

Red climbing roses entwined the columns and spread the red brick terrace, overlooking a green lawn with a magnolia tree and a dogwood tree, both in full bloom.

Adding elegance and beauty were the white lacy designs in wrought iron lawn chairs and tables. A white picket fence enclosed the Dan Hooley orchestra which furnished music for dancing.

The gym floor was bricked off all the way around (with white paper bricks) for the lovely garden party in progress. Rows of pines grew beyond the garden wall. On the left side, up in the grandstand, was "Uncle Remus' log cabin, reached by a cobblesone path. A life-size Uncle Remus, complete with mossy gray hair and corn cob pipe, which cast shadows on the cotton patch.

The class colors, floated over the head and the tables in the improvised garden were decorated with yellow and white glads. On the right were large punch bowls repeatedly filled with yellow punch.

The banquet menu offered baked ham, sweetened oysters (yellow and white) relish trays, creamed peas with mushroom sauce, southern biscuit, iced tea and magnolia cake squares.

The program began with a welcome address by Phillip Howard, president of the junior class, followed by the response from Bill Nesmith, senior class president.

An "Old South" minstrel was presented, featuring John Dekle, interactor.

End men were Bill Stubbs, Al DeLoach, Skip Aldred, and Marshall Thigpen.

A sextette, introducing Joe Waters, Nicky Brown, Dennis DeLoach, Pete Johnson, Bill Adams and Roberts Adams; vocal solo, Henry Brown; drum solo, Jimmy Tidwell; Musical skit, Earl Smith; Harmonica, Marshall Thigpen; Smets Blitch, leader.

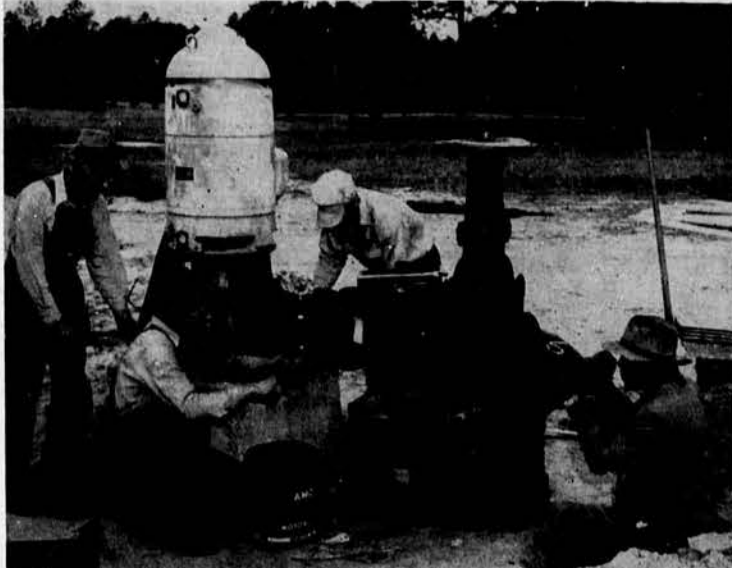

Most insects can be controlled
USDA entomologists tells FB

Most insects can be controlled with the insecticides now available if applied as manufacturer directs, Grover C. Bryant, entomologist with the USDA, stated at the Brooklet Farm Bureau meeting Wednesday night.

Mr. Bryant reported that most of the white-fringed beetles in that area were under control as far as they could tell. The invasion of the sweet potato weevil is feared and being carefully watched, he pointed out.

Areas infested with sweet potato weevils are being treated with 25 to 30 pounds per acre of corn meal or cottonseed meal (50 pounds), 40 to 50 per cent chlordane wettable powder (two pounds), mixed with enough water to moisten, will help control mole crickets probably better than any other material.
