School board reviews progress since 1950

With overcrowded conditions already existing and the condition becoming more and more acute in the Statesboro High School and elementary schools in the county the Bulloch County Board of Education felt that a survey of the county's school needs should be made.

The decision to ask for a survey was made at the board meeting on April 3, and the survey was made by Dr. Joe Williams of the University of Georgia; Dr. J. D. Park of the Georgia Teachers College; Knapp Bodiford, superintendent of Screven county school; G. N. Baker, Georgia State Department of Education; Oscar Jolley, State Department of Education; C. W. McGuffey, State Department of Education; Robert L. Cousins, State Department of Education, in charge of Negro education.

According to J. H. Wyatt, chairman of the county school board, this group spent three days in an intensive study of the school plants and situation in the county.

In announcing the request for the school survey the board members reviewed the progress made in the county since a similar survey was made in 1950, when the following recommendations were made:

The merging of the Statesboro city school system and the county school system, the consolidation of Lenfield with Brooklet and Stilton elementary schools, the building of a new high school at Brooklet or near to receive the recognition.

High and Statesboro high schools, West Side elementary school, Brooklet, Stilton, Nevils, Milledgeville and Register elementary schools to be maintained in their present locations, the Warnock school to be consolidated with the Laboratory School. Part to be maintained as a permanent elementary and high school center. The Register High School to be consolidated with the Lab High and Statesboro high schools, West Side elementary and high school to be consolidated with the Statesboro elementary and high schools.

OUR SOIL * OUR STRENGTH

Soil Conservation Service

It looks like the problem of planting behind combined grain has been solved to a great extent by J. T. McAlister, Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service from Orangeburg, South Carolina. On a demonstration held recently in Chandler county Mr. McAlister, assisting the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District, showed a group of farmers and technical agricultural workers that it is possible to do a good job of planting grain stable without burning off.

Burning off grain fields after the combine is becoming all too common in Bulloch county. It is too bad to see plant food as well as valuable organic matter go "up in smoke." The value of organic materials to the water holding capacity of the soil cannot be overestimated. Neither can its value in reducing erosion, wind and water be overemphasized. It also has a

Farm Bureau Peanut growers report fungus had reduced peanut stand by half

The outbreak of southern blight or southern rot or white mold, called by all these names, on peanuts in the county brought out a lot of discussion at the Farm Bureau meetings last week. It seems that this fungus is causing more damage than normal to the peanut stands and has attacked the

crop earlier than usual. Numerous peanut growers have reported that the disease has reduced their stands by 50 per cent already and still causing the plants to die. The disease attacks the plants at or near the soil line. The pegs of development. The only control known is to turn under any litter deep before planting and then avoid any damage to the plants by plowing, insects or disease to prevent the fungus from entering the plant. Some of the damage to peanuts now is being caused by cutworms, leaf spot, leaf minor and thrips. Dusting with something like toxaphene with a sulfur base will be of material value in controlling this group of problems. It was brought out at the meetings.

The need for the wider use of a wet-bulb thermometer, or hygrometer, in curing tobacco was discussed at Ivanhoe. This type of thermometer takes the
