Bangs disease of swine now serious problem

Editor's Note: It has come to our attention that Bangs Disease (Brucellosis) of swine is becoming serious in our section. The Georgia State Experiment Station at Tifton has prepared information based on results of practical experiments on the disease and we publish it here, hoping that it will be of aid to farmers in Bulloch county who are having trouble with it in their hogs.

BANGS DISEASE (BRUCELOSIS) OF SWINE Judging from blood tests in our laboratory and inquiries about the disease from farmers, Bangs disease of swine is becoming increasingly important in Georgia. In infected herds the disease may be of great economic importance as the productivity of the sows is often cut an average of 50 per cent.

CAUSE AND SIGNS OF THE DISEASE Bangs disease of swine is caused by bacteria called Brucella suis. They are closely related to the germs that cause Bangs disease in cattle and goats. People can contract this disease from all three germs. In people it is called undulant fever or brucellosis. In South Georgia, an important swine raising district, one survey revealed 85 per cent of the human cases to be caused by the swine germ. Cattle can become infected with the swine germ but the reverse does not usually occur.

Declining daily average attendance and the reasons for it formed the basis for the discussions were very frank and freely presented. At the suggestion of Chairman Wyatt, the group voted to name a committee to work with the county school superintendent and his staff to help correct the condition, if possible. James E. Davis, Stilton president, asked J. L. Akins, Willis Williams, H. L. Hood, Jr., Francis Groover and Harold McElwee to serve on this committee.

HOW DISEASE SPREADS IN HERD The most common way in which the disease is spread is by the boar at breeding time. Swine Bangs disease is unlike the condition in cattle in this respect as the bull plays a very minor role in the spread of the disease in cattle. Thus, a diseased boar in whose sex organs the germs have located can infect a high percentage of the females in a herd during a single breeding season. For this reason it is most important to blood test the boar prior to each breeding period.

TREATMENT AND VACCINATION There is no treatment for Bangs disease in swine nor has any vaccination procedure been accepted. Actually these are not readily controlled by the procedures listed above.

BUYING REPLACEMENTS Naturally, new hogs should be obtained from known Bangs free herds. They should be purchased long enough before they will be needed so at least two negative tests at a 30 day interval can be had before the boar is used. In assembling new herds it is better to buy animals from one source rather than increase the chances of buying an infected animal by buying from several sources.

THE BLOOD TEST The blood test is the only diagnostic test readily available at present. Due to certain limitations it has in swine, it is recommended as a herd test only and is not considered reliable as an individual hog test. However, as it is the only test readily available, we are forced to use it on an individual basis.

FCIC explains soil bank part

Tobacco farmers whose crop investments are protected by federal all-risk crop insurance need an acreage release before placing it in the acreage reserve program of the Soil Bank Act unless the tobacco crop on such acreage has been destroyed by an insured cause of loss. D. H. McCullough, FCIC state director, announced today.

He pointed out that under the provisions of the tobacco policy insurance would not be considered to have attached and no premium would be earned on acreage destroyed by insured farmers to comply with a Department of Agriculture program such as the Soil Bank. In order to obtain a revision of premiums in these cases policyholders should get their acreage reports revised by presenting evidence that the destroyed acreage left for production after replacing a part of the acreage reported for insurance in the Soil Bank.

Tobacco acreage destroyed by natural causes will be released by the corporation in the usual manner, the state FCIS director said, and policyholders as usual should get such destroyed acreage released by a corporation adjuster before putting it to other use.

Cotton farmers are urged to use effective and immediate control measures for the boll weevil and bollworm. Dr. C. R. Jordan, Agricultural Extension Service entomologist, says infestations of both are alarmingly high for this time of year.

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Statesboro's 29th tobacco season to open July 25; 11 warehouses ready

On Wednesday, July 25, the Statesboro Tobacco Market will begin its 29th year of sales with the last 10 years as the largest market in the Georgia-Florida belt.

The Statesboro Tobacco Market this season is stressing the fact that it pays a grower to sell on an old established market where warehousemen have had years of experience which assures the grower of top prices.

The market is also pointing out to the growers that there are 11 warehouses with 640,000 square feet of floor space which assures the grower that there will be no crowding. The Statesboro market will have a usual, two full sets of buyers representing every large domestic and foreign purchaser of flue-cured tobacco.

The warehouses here this year will again be operated by old-timers: W. E. Cobb and H. P. Falkath at the Cobb and Foxhall warehouse, Aulbert J. Brannen and J. T. Sheppard at Sheppard's warehouse, Cecil Woolton, Ed Wiggins and George Suggs at the New Statesboro, and Guy Sutton at the Farmers.

The Statesboro market took the lead as Georgia's largest in 1946 and that year sold 14,670,387 pounds. In 1955 the poundage sold jumped to 16,146,166 pounds and last year 20,191,100 pounds. In 1953, the Statesboro market sold 15,663,291 pounds for \$7,165,861.00, which was more money than the 17,131,170 brought in 1954.

Mr. Cobb stated that with the future in mind the bank purport will permit bank customers to transact their banking business while sitting in their car. This eliminates the bothersome problem of finding a parking place in order to use the bank.

The group will return to Statesboro Friday afternoon. They plan to visit the University of Georgia and Rock Eagle, where they will have lunch, Friday enroute to Statesboro. They will carry a lunch up Monday and stop at Indian Springs to eat. The group leaves Statesboro at 7:30 from the county agent's office Monday morning.
