Do this now!

Is your child one of the 5,647 children in Bulloch county who have not been immunized against polio with the Salk polio vaccine?

Is your child one of the 3,700 who has taken advantage of the program who now needs to have the third or "booster" shot?

Dr. Hubert U. King, director of the health district, including Bulloch county, reported this week that there are 9,347 children in our county eligible to receive the Salk vaccine. Of this number only 3,700 have taken advantage of the program and that that same number now need to have their "booster" shot.

All children six months old through 19 years of age are eligible to receive the vaccine, as well as all expectant mothers, regardless of age.

Dr. King reports that there is now plenty of the vaccine on hand to give immunizations to those who have not had them as well as to those who need the "booster" shot.

Medical authorities all over the country feel that the Salk polio vaccine is one of the safest vaccines now available. This is insured by the very rigid standards set up by the U. S. Public Health Service and its advisory committee for manufacture of the vaccine.

Its effectiveness has been proven in field studies throughout the nation. It is now known that paralysis from polio occurs five times more often in unvaccinated children.

We marvel that every mother and father of every child in Bulloch county has not rushed to the health center or to their family doctor to have their child given the vaccine. We should know that the risk is so great for those not vaccinated that to neglect having all children vaccinated amounts to almost criminal negligence.

Don't put it off any longer. The polio season is now upon us. Take this precaution today to protect the life and health of your child. See your family doctor or attend the clinic at the health center on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 1 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon, and Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 9 to 12 o'clock in the morning.

Yesterday saw the beginning of the climax for the farmer. The next several weeks will see whether his labor and concern have been in vain. His entire family is interested in what the next several weeks brings. It means the difference between a new refrigerator, a new car, new home furnishings, new clothes, funds for Junior's next college year and making do what they already have.

Everyone in Bulloch county joins the farmer in hoping for the very best.

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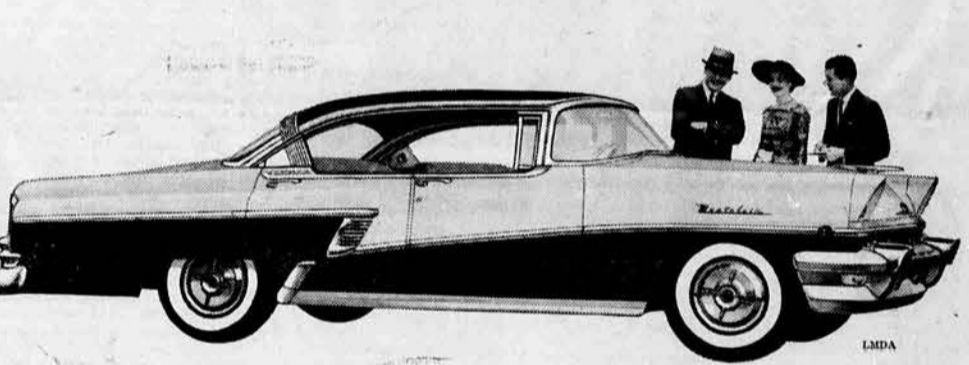

of discrimination on the basis of age, sex or marital status in both government and industry, with special emphasis on civil service career and appointment positions in local, state and national government, and women in the armed forces, strengthen and make effective the United States advance international economic development through technical assistance and reduction of trade barriers; and strengthen the North Atlantic Treaty Organization—all through support of legislation within the framework of the United States Constitution. Tax adjustments asked, directly affecting the interests of employed women, include: allowance of an income reduction to an employed person for cost of care of dependents because of said employment, and permit to take double income tax for a dependent over 65 and blind, to whom he has contributed more than one-half support.

"The federation will petition both Democratic and Republican parties to include in their platform plank endorsement of equal pay for equal work.

"The federation is against lowering the age of retirement for women from 65 to 62, but would maintain a uniform retirement age under the Social Security Act.

"3rd—As to programs this year, the national office will provide research material and advice, when requested. Suggested committee aids will be sent out only on request.

"4th—International relations BPW has a special obligation in the international field, Miss Rawl said, for 'on the whole there is an unquestioned acceptance of the leadership of American business and professional women, and the feeling that American women can do most to encourage and aid

women over the world.

5th—Public affairs—Miss Rawl said that 'women must look to the future when they have equal responsibility with men in leadership.' They now lead the way in the area of service, she said, but lag in citizenship leadership. Nor, she said, are there enough women in business, politics and government, simply because, she added, 'we haven't fully made up our minds to aim for the top.' She challenged the federation to active leadership of the five million new young women workers and twenty million already in the labor market.

"6th—Support of the new research foundation, a great forward step for the federation. A pledge of \$500 by the Georgia Federation, which will mean about 25 cents per member per club.

"7th—Educations and vocations committee changed to 'Career Advancement' to interest younger members.

"8th—News service and radio and television changed to 'Public Relations,' this phase of club activities becoming increasingly important in keeping BPW on the map, and advertising the splendid thing we have.

"9th—Southeast regional dates August 8-10, 1957—Birmingham, Ala.

"10th—Next biennial, 1958, Seattle, Washington.

Dear Sir:

In his column of July 12, 1956, Mr. Max Lockwood suggests a southern boycott of any company local or national known or rumored to have given aid or comfort to the causes of segregation. It does not seem possible that Mr. Lockwood realizes the economic implications of such a suggestion. The economy of the South is fully interlocked with that of the nation and with other sections of the country. Southern farmers, manufacturers, and business men depend upon markets in the North and in the West. They could not do very well without such markets. A boycott of the industry of other sections might well result in the destruction of the South, because of their sales in other sections. Let us not cut our own economic necks in the present social conflict over segregation.

Preston against civil rights bill. WASHINGTON, July 19.—The Civil Rights Bill now before the House "effectively destroys the sovereignty of the several states," Congressman Prince Preston said today on the floor of the House in denouncing the proposed legislation.

Preston said that, "Such a law as that which is proposed is not just needless, it is wicked and dangerous."

Preston quoted the French poet Lamartine's lament, "Oh, Liberty, Liberty! What crimes are committed in thy name! The said future historians may describe this era by saying, 'Oh, Civil Rights, Civil Rights! What crimes are committed in thy name.' He urged the House to reject overwhelmingly the Civil Rights Bill which he described as "repugnant in every detail."
