M.D.A.A. seeks chapter here

The first step in the organization of a Bulloch County chapter of the Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America was made here Tuesday of this week when a group met with Mrs. R. N. Hubert, regional director for eight states in the Southeast, and Miss Goldwire, public relations director for the organization.

Those at the meeting were Dr. Fielding Russell, Miss Maule White, Mrs. Tom Alexander, Miss Sara Hall, Dr. Hubert, King, medical director of the Bulloch County Health Department, Leodei Coleman, Mrs. Jewell Sanders and Mrs. Franceska Owens, county health nurses.

Another meeting was planned for Tuesday, September 4, to complete the plans for the organization.

Mrs. Rogers N. Herbert, regional director, and M. L. (Mike) Goldwire, executive secretary for M.D.A.A. in Georgia, will speak at the meeting on the urgency of the problem of muscular dystrophy in the United States.

All persons interested in this problem are urged to attend the meeting.

More than 200,000 Americans, the majority of them children, suffer from muscular dystrophy which wastes the muscles of the body until its victims are completely helpless and die. There is no known remedy for the disease.

Through the annual March of Dimes, M.D.A.A. presently supports more than seventy research projects, and provides aid to victims locally. Plans are underway for establishment of a \$3,000,000 muscle research center to be affiliated with the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center.

Dr. Russell said he looks forward to community support of the new chapter.

## Preston speaks to Uvalda crowd

UVALDA, Ga., Aug. 18.—Rep. Preston told an enthusiastic crowd here tonight that the Eisenhower Administration's betrayal of the American farmer was one of the most "shameful acts of treachery in the history of the American people," and promised to continue his fight for 90 per cent parity in the next Congress.

"In my ten years in Congress I have fought first, last and always for the farmers of the First District," the Appropriations Subcommittee chairman asserted, "and when I go back to Washington in January to serve, God willing, under President Adlai Stevenson, I pledge to continue my fight under administration that will give relief and not just casual lip service to the farmers of this nation."

Preston re-affirmed his determined opposition to the Supreme court's decision on school integration. "I yield to no man in the strength of my conviction that no court decision, no executive decree, and no legislative act should be allowed to undermine or overthrow the sacred traditions and customs by which we in the South have lived in harmony for many generations," the First District Representative said.

"I repeat what I have said on the floor of the House so many times, 'As one who was born and reared in Georgia, and who has raised two precious daughters to young womanhood under our time-honored traditions, I am determined, as you are determined, to resist the Supreme Court's decision with every recourse at my command,'" he said.

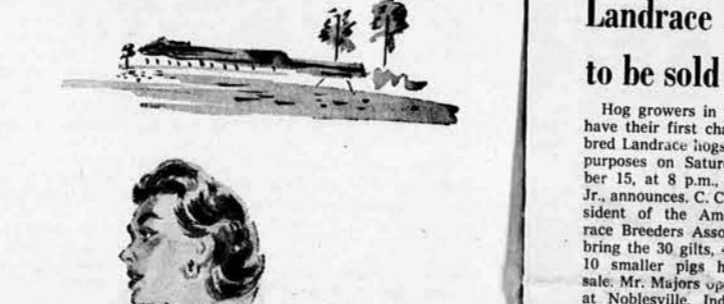

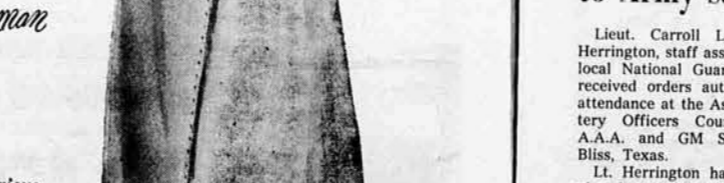

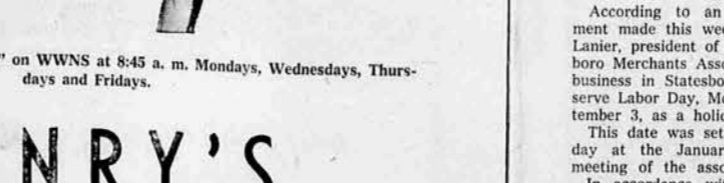
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
