

The Time report reads, "Griffin well understood. Said he affably: 'Thank you, John. I'll just tell the boys that Yankee %&()\$ wouldn't give me any time." (Editor's note: The word used by Time is one not commonly used in polite company.)

On Wednesday night Governor Griffin threatened a suit for damages against Time magazine unless the magazine retracts the remarks attributed to him. The Governor wired the editor of the magazine:

"I complimented John McCormack on the way he handled the minority report. You will either retract his statement or you can expect a suit for damages. At no time during the convention did I use any profanity in making statements or in any other deliberations of the convention. I have high respect for John McCormack and your quotation is false. Please furnish the name of the reporter who made this up. I stated Georgia's position in a gentlemanly manner. The Georgia delegations voted against the platform and against the minority report."

He sent a copy of the telegram to Mr. McCormack. In a news account dated August 23, Rep. John McCormack con-
