and more dangerous, as more and more employees are added to the company's payroll. And before another accident

should occur and before someone should become seriously injured or killed our city, county and state officials concerned with highway safety and the wellbeing of our people should get together and lick that problem which exists at our new Rockwell plant.

We owe it to the management of the plant, to our people who are employed there and to the tourists who use our U. S. 301. And it should be done now!




