Statesboro tobacco market leads Ga. with 15,912,370 lbs.

The 1956 tobacco season closed here on Friday, August 31. With the final figures not yet official, the Statesboro market led the state in pounds, having sold 15,912,370 pounds for \$6,901,798.22. Last year the Statesboro market led the state with 15,545,430 pounds for \$7,164,812.82. In 1954 the market here sold 17,054,098 pounds for \$6,723,739.64.

Bulloch County's retail Sales for first half 1956 hit \$10,042,033

Bulloch County retail sales for the first six months of 1956, January through June, were \$823,098 ahead of the same six months in 1955. According to figures released by the Georgia State Chamber of Commerce based on reports of the Georgia Department of Revenue and the Georgia Department of Labor, Bulloch's sales for the first half of 1956 were \$10,042,033. The sales for the first half of 1955 were \$9,209,944. Total sales for 1955 were \$18,927,807. For 1954 total sales were \$17,638,419.

Bulloch County erects historical marker here

Visitors and homefolk alike now can know when Bulloch County was created, for whom it was named, and the first county officers.

Last week the County Commissioners erected a historical marker on the Courthouse Square on the corner in front of our Confederate Monument on which are these facts.

The marker was furnished the county by the Georgia Historical Commission. It reads: "Bulloch County was created by Act of February 8, 1796, from Bryan and Screven Counties. Originally it contained parts of Evans, Candler, Emanuel and Jenkins Counties. It was named for Archibald Bulloch (1730-1777), Revolutionary leader, elected President of the Executive Council of Georgia, January 20, 1776. He was first Provisional Governor of Georgia, January 22, 1776. First county officers commissioned March 25, 1796, were Charles McCall Jr., sheriff; Andrew E. Wells, Clerk of Superior Court; George Elliott, Clerk of Inferior Court; Francis Well, Register of Probate; James Bird, Surveyor; Carrott Williams, Coroner."

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In an announcement made by Jaycee Ed Olliff, chairman of the Jaycee "Get Out the Vote" committee, voters of Statesboro and surrounding vicinity who cannot get to the courthouse to vote will only have to dial POPlar 4-3531, on September 12.
