To complete the building program as recommended \$800,000.00 is needed. Under the constitution a county board cannot issue over 7 per cent of tax digest. This was done in 1951 although no new tax was passed to meet the payments.

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GTC Freshmen, Transfer Students Make New Enrollment Record

A record-breaking number of students streamed into Georgia Teachers College this week, setting the total mark at 862, including three special students.

The enrollment tops last year's figure by some 15 per cent according to Miss Viola Perry, G.T.C. registrar. At the time, there were only 750 students on campus.

Despite the large freshman class, the bulk of the increase came from the enrollment of over 100 upperclassmen transfer students.

The increase here is in line with hikes of enrollment figures in colleges all over the country, according to Dr. Henderson.

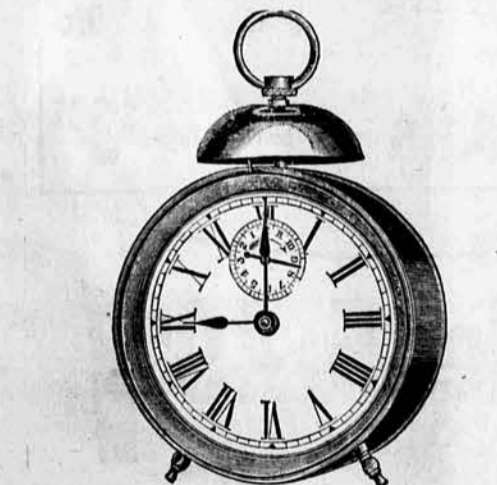
H. P. Womack and J. H. Wyatt talk about school bonds at F. B. meeting
