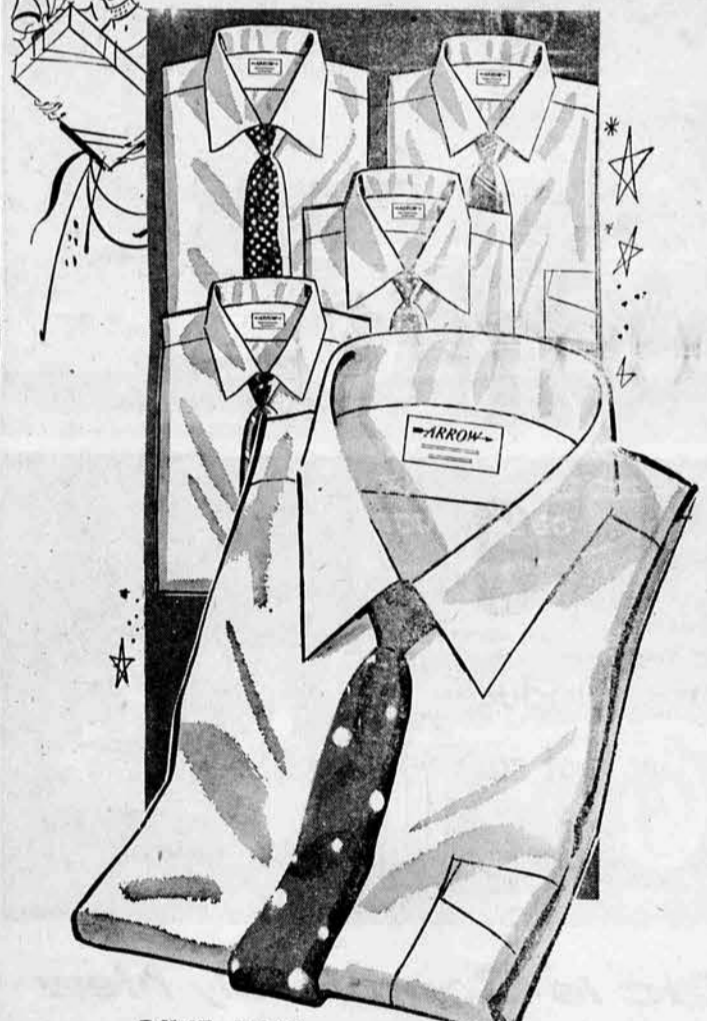

Worth County AGRICULTURAL CORNUCOPA Worth was named after General William J. Worth, Seminole Indian fighter and hero of the Mexican War. It was Worth to whom Mexico City surrendered. Fort Worth, Texas, is another of the General's namesakes. Worth County ranks high in production of all farm products, particularly tobacco and truck, and is Georgia's second highest peanut producer with over 31 million pounds raised in 1954. Friendly Sylvania, S. 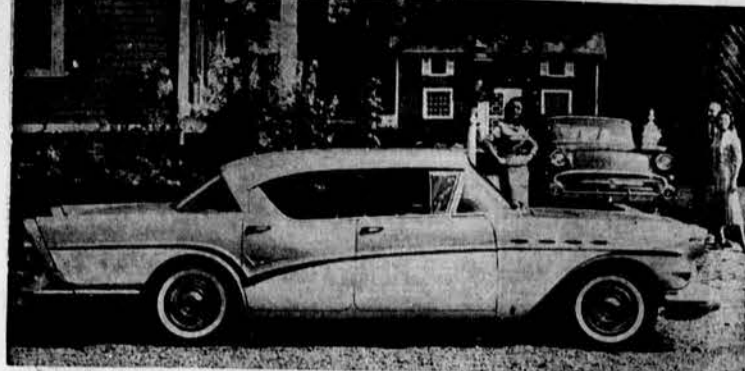

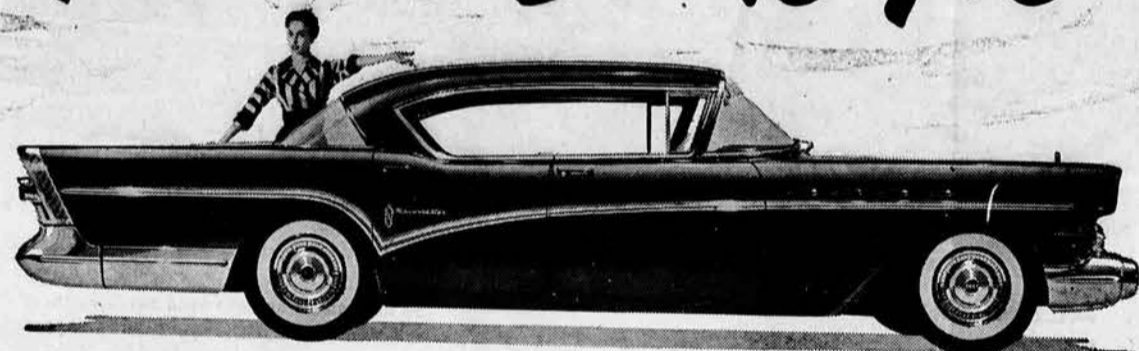
