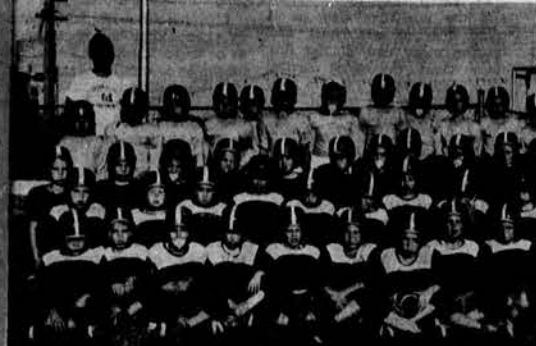

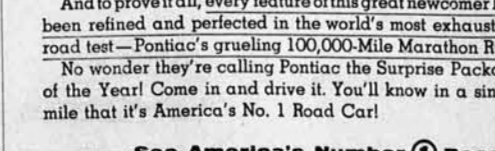

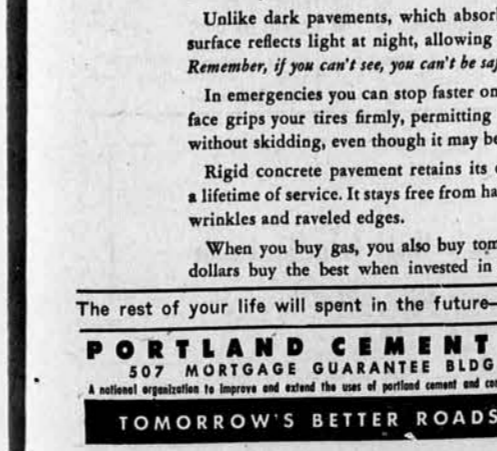

Prisoners show big majority in general election
Rep. Prince Preston won an overwhelming victory over his independent opponent in Tuesday's General Election, according to final tabulations from the thirteen counties of the First District.

Preston's majority ranged from 1,094 to 0 in Wheeler County to 12,421 to 9,833 in Chatham County. In Bryan County the vote was 1,516 for Preston and 14 for his opponent and in Montgomery County Preston's opponent obtained four votes to 1,029 for the incumbent representative.

Again, as in the September primary, the seventeen rural counties of the First District gave Preston far more impressive majorities than that which he obtained in Chatham County.

Exclusive of Chatham County the vote in the general election was Preston 28,641, and Anastos 1,334. Including the tabulation in Chatham County, the total vote was Preston 41,062, Anastos 11,167. The vote by counties in the Congressional race was as follows:
