THE FIRST PRESIDENTIAL THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

By The President of the United States of America

WHEREAS, it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty God, to obey his Will, to be grateful for his Benefits, and humbly to implore his Protection and Favour;

AND whereas both houses of Congress have, by their joint Committee, requested me "To recommend to the People of the UNITED STATES, a Day of PUBLIC THANKSGIVING and PRAYER, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful Hearts the many Single Favours of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably for their Safety and Happiness."

NOW THEREFORE, I do recommend and assign THURSDAY, the Twenty-Second Day of November next, to be devoted by the People of these States, to the Service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficial Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be: That we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind Care and Protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation;

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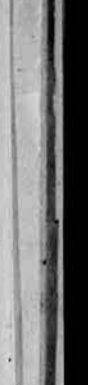
